HAY IS PERHAPS the most important of all crops in the St. Lawrence valley. Owing to the frequent rains this spring and summer the growth of grass has been abundant, and if it can be well cured it will prove a valuable crop. In some localities where the land is low and is not drained the crop is light, but as a rule both hay and coarse grains promise well. A couple of weeks of sunny weather and light dry winds would be a great boon to the farmers.

RARE FISH.—A rare and beautiful fish was on exhibition at the Quinny, market recently, said to be the second of the kind ever seen in Boston. Its scales are composed of a large circular substance, which has the appearance of bone, and a little larger than a silver dollar, the scales being coated with a substance that wonderfully resembles silver. The fish weighs just 84 lbs., and measures 6 1/2 feet in length, with a well-rounded body not differing very much from that of a halibut.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Fast Steamship Service.

OTTAWA, July 15.

In reference to the West India and South American steamship service the Government intend inviting tenders for four distinct lines, first Halifax and St. John to Cuba, calling at Havana and Matanzas. Second, Halifax and St. John to Jamaica, calling at Bermuda and Turks Island. Third, Halifax and St. John, calling at Yarmouth, if from St. John to Demerara calling at Bermuda, St. Kitts, Antigua, Guadalupe, Dominica, Martinique, St. Lucia, Barbados and Trinidad. Fourth, Halifax and St. John to Buenos Ayres, calling at Pernambuco, Rio Janeiro, Montevideo, and such other ports in South America and the West Indies as may be agreed on in the interests of trade, the service to be monthly, and the speed required twelve knots. The West India line's capacity to be one thousand tons register, and the South American line two thousand tons. Tenders for steamers of other speed and capacity will be received and considered, the above merely indicating the conditions desired by the Government. Tenders will be received until August 31st for a contract term of five years.

News from Wimbledon.

LONDON, July 15.

The Canadian riflemen at Wimbledon are making an excellent record. They have entered for every contest, and have always had a man on every prize list. Private Armstrong and Sergt. Ogg are doing especially well. Each is in the last stage of the Queen's prize competition. In the Corporation contest Sergt. Ogg scored the highest, and wins the silver cup. All the fourteen other prizes belong to the Canadians except two. The Kolapore Cup eight were chosen to-day. Jersey, India and the Mother Country will compete. Canadian hopes for victory run high.

The Tenants to Combine.

LONDON, July 15.

The Parnellites held a meeting in a room in the House of Commons to-day, and Parnell moved that it is imperatively necessary that the tenant farmers of Ireland combine for self defence against their attempted extermination by a landlord conspiracy. Thomas Power O'Connor seconded the motion, and a committee was appointed to prepare a constitution for the new league. The committee is composed of Parnell, Justin McCarthy, Thomas Sexton, T. P. O'Connor, William O'Brien, Timothy Harrington, and T. P. Gill.

Archbishop Lynch's Successor.

TORONTO, July 15.

If the successor of the late Archbishop Lynch be not appointed next week, nothing will be heard from Rome until after next October. The cardinals take their vacation in July, ending the last day in October, and between the two periods the Roman Court does not transact business. It is now said that Bishop Walsh is out of the race, his years being, to a certain extent, a bar to his accepting office.

The French Credit.

PARIS, July 15.

The Chamber of Deputies, by 461 to 12, to-day approved of the bill providing for a credit of 28 million francs, to spread over five years, for building warships.
