Yesterday, twenty-nine years ago, the great Irish orator, statesman and poet, Thomas D'Arcy McGee, met his death by the bullet of the assassin. Whilst on his way to his hotel from the House of Commons, within whose walls a few hours before he had delivered one of the most brilliant speeches of his life, he was met by the murderer and in the blaze of the moonlight he was hurled into eternity. No more cowardly act had ever been committed. In McGee, Canada lost a great statesman, Old Ireland a warm hearted son and the English speaking world a poet of the highest order of genius.

The Ottawa Free Press (Liberal) says: "His Excellency Mgr. Merry del Val is beginning to feel the strain of his arduous work. The reception of visitors, visiting the Catholic institutions and replying to addresses, have so overtaxed his strength that yesterday the great mental strain resulted in a slight hemorrhage. This morning he received a large number of visitors, among them being Mr. F. B. Hayes, chief English translator of the House of Commons, who placed at His Excellency's disposal the records and papers of the House."

WHERE LIGHTNING STRIKES.—The belief that lightning will not strike a feather bed was shown to be mistaken by an incident of the electric storm of Saturday. A bolt struck a chimney on the house of Charles Steates, who lives on the Deerfield road. Part of it jumped to the house of Bernard Ross and tore off the conductor pipe. The other part went down the chimney, ripped the plaster and paper from a bedroom, and then struck a feather bed. The bed was torn and the feathers scattered about the room.—Utica Morning Herald.

IDLE AT ROSSLAND.—Writing to the Glengarry News, Mr. J. A. McDonald, of Nelson, B. C., formerly of Glengarry, warns Glengarryians against rushing headlong to the gold fields expecting to make a fortune. Speaking of Rossland, he says: "There are three thousand men here who cannot get a day's work, while upwards of a hundred men have been arriving daily for the last month, and I believe that before summer is over there will be fully ten thousand men here."

### MR. M'CREADY'S LECTURE.

The lecture delivered by Mr. McCreedy in Zion Church basement, last evening, was decidedly the most interesting of this season, and, in our opinion, one of the best. Mr. McCreedy threw off his party predilections for the nonce and gave an unbiased description of several of those who have been our foremost men in Parliament. Of these were Sir John McDonald and Alexander McKenzie, Howe and Tupper, McGee, Blake and Laurier. The lighter side of the Parliamentary picture was presented in the various scenes depicted. A vote of thanks, proposed by Mr. Benjamin Rogers, M. L. A., of Alberton, seconded by Mr. Bell, M. L. A., of Summerside, and supported by Messrs. Charles Palmer and T. A. McLean, was conveyed to the lecturer by the Hon. Donald Fairquharson, who occupied the chair.
