SUCCESSFUL AT HALIFAX.—Miss M. H. Chisholm, of Charlottetown, has captured first prize for china painting at the Halifax Exhibition. Referring to her exhibit, the Halifax Herald says: "The display of china painting by Miss M. H. Chisholm is a particularly fine one. She shows rose plates, fish sets, shells, etc., from nature. The jewel and raised paste work is a feature of her exhibit. There are other pictures, including a scene, and several pieces from the brush of Miss Chisholm, which are gems."

THE THEATRE.—Last night the best comedy of the season was played before an audience that filled the Opera House, by the Boston Comedy Company. The play was an excellent imitation of Shakespeare's inimitable "Taming of the Shrew." The plot was shortly this: The Duke Aranza marries Juliana, a beautiful woman with a haughty and domineering disposition, who is determined that she shall not be ruled by such an ordinary and base creature as a man. After the wedding she takes her to a lovely dwelling, and disclaims his title and fortune. After many amusing scenes by unobedient firmness he conquers the pride of the beautiful Juliana, until finally she confesses that she loves him and becomes a properly submissive wife. He then, to her surprise, resumes his real title. The plot gave many opportunities for side plays, and the whole abounded in humor and fun of the highest character. The costumes were costly and superb. Edwin Grey outdid himself as Juliana, while C. H. Stevens, after he became wedded to his work, made a great hit as Duke Aranza. Lampido, the thin country doctor, called forth round after round of applause, but the star of the evening was H. Price Webster, as Jacques, a kitchen servant, who was elevated to the rank of Duke for the month of Aranza's absence. Tonight the popular Irish drama, "Kathleen Mavourneen," and the laughable farce of "The Dumb Belle" will be the attraction.

TEACHERS' CONVENTION.—Sessions of the Teachers' Convention were held last evening and this forenoon. We are compelled to hold over their extended reports. It was resolved "that the Executive Committee continue to press upon the Government the necessity of providing efficient training for teachers at the Prince of Wales College. The Superintendent of Education delivered an excellent address in respect to his observations while abroad last year, and received the unanimous thanks of the Convention. Principal Mellish read a paper on "How to Secure Regularity of Attendance," and the Hon. T. H. Haviland delivered a short address.

THE NAVAL BATTLE. An Eye Witness Describes the China-Japan Engagement.

LONDON, Sept. 26.—A despatch from Shanghai says an eye-witness gives the following account of the naval battle: While 8 Chinese warships were lying at the entrance of the Yalu river, 12 Japanese vessels were in sight. The Japanese ships advanced in single line, while the Chinese fleet assumed a V-shaped formation, with the flag-ship at the apex. In consequence, the Chinese vessels were rendered useless. The Japanese in the passage opened fire on the Chinese, who replied to the best of their ability. After the battle had been in progress for a short time, the Chinese fleet altered its formation. The Japanese fleet kept steaming in a circle round the Chinese. Suddenly the Japanese withheld their fire, but after a quarter of an hour resumed. The Chinese Armstrong cruiser went out of line, contrary to orders, steaming alongside of one of the Japanese ships and sunk her. The Chinese cruiser was sunk shortly afterwards. About this time two Chinese warships, which had been on guard on the Yalu river, hearing the firing, joined the fleet and took part in the battle. This increased the number of Chinese ships engaged to ten. A short time afterwards another Chinese ship was sunk, and two others ran ashore, caught fire and were abandoned. The Japanese withdrew after six hours' fighting. The Chinese ships followed them, but were unable to overtake them. It is presumed that the Japanese ships retired because they were short of ammunition.

The damage to the Chin Yuen is chiefly in her woodwork, which is nearly all burned away. She also received about 200 shot holes in her sides, mostly from machine guns. None of the shots pierced her armor more than three inches. The Chin Yuen had 120 shot holes in her sides and is generally in the same condition as the Chin Yuen. When the Tung Yuan, the Chin Yuen's sister ship, arrived at Port Arthur, she was three feet down by the head.

It will require two months to make the necessary repairs to the Chinese fleet. One Japanese ship was certainly sunk and two others were supposed to have gone to the bottom. The maneuvering of the Japanese ships was excellent. All their signals were executed by flag and were promptly answered throughout the battle. The Chinese ships had scarcely any ammunition left.

Japanese war ships are cruising on the Shang Tung coast, presumably looking for Chinese transports and cruisers. An edict has been issued announcing that the celebration of the Dowager Empress' birthday has been postponed and money collected for that purpose will be donated to the war expenses.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 26.—It is reported that the native officials here received news last night that the Japanese attacked the Chinese forces at Anchow, and Yichow simultaneously, and were repulsed at both places.

GOING TO GEORGETOWN.—The new steamer, cruiser Aberdeen will be in Georgetown next Monday.

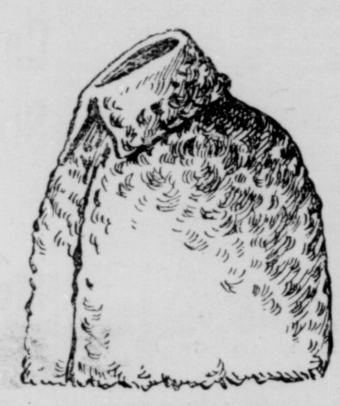
