TEACHERS' IN SESSIONS

Meeting of Eastern and Western Associations.

The teachers of the Western Inspectorate met at Kensington yesterday. The address of the President, Mr. J. A. Ready, B. A., is described as a carefully prepared production, full of valuable suggestions for teachers and others. McCormac, Mr. Francis Egan read a capital paper dealing with the teaching of English. Interesting papers were also read by Mr. J. Doyle and Mr. J. J. Macdonald, and the Question Box was opened. In the evening an entertainment was given.

THE CAMPAIGN.

A Good Meeting at Hunter River.

Mr. Simon Brown occupied the chair at the large meeting held at Hunter River last evening, and Mr. Bell acted as secretary.

Mr. Wise made a clear and sensible statement concerning the causes of his loss of confidence in the Farquharson Government, and the deceptive and dishonest tactics of which he has since been the victim. He was followed by Dr. Douglas, Mr. Campbell, Mr. Farquharson, A. A. McLean, Attorney General McKinnon—the defeated of Murray Harbour—Mr. Thomas Doyle and Mr. J. C. Clarke.

In the course of his remarks Mr. McLean effectually disposed of the Premier's small and mean charge against Mr. Wise—if there was anything wrong in paying Mr. Wise \$350 for his services in England, the Farquharson government is the party in the wrong—by reference to the fact that Mr. Farquharson took \$500 out of the Provincial treasury for his services while acting as Premier and has received about \$10,000 from the Dominion government on account of his dredge tender.
