**ABOLITION OF MARKET TOLLS.**

ATTENTION is directed to the report of the informal meeting of the City Council held last evening. The total amount per year obtained as a result of Mr. R. McLaren's good offices is about \$675. The question is, would it not be better for the corporation to lose this sum in the expectation of more friendly relations between the market people and the merchants, — and an increased trade. While we are for protection to local industry as against outsiders, we are for the freest possible exchange between the various localities and classes of each Province and between the different Provinces of our National Confederation. Upon this ground we oppose the Commercial Travellers' tax, and upon this ground we oppose the taxation of the country by the town or the town by the country. It is, of course, true that the shelter afforded those residents of the country who attend the market where city customers resort, is an advantage in their trade for which a consideration may fairly be charged. Those who occupy stalls in the market have to pay for them; why not those who take seats at the market tables? On the other hand why not give the sellers the privilege of a free market on the ground that prices will be lowered by increased competition and that a greater amount will be expended among city merchants? The question is one for consideration.

**THE STATE ELECTIONS.**

It is significant that the November elections have been held without any perceptible twisting of the lion's tail. Friendship for England has increased to such an extent in the States that neither of the parties has found it expedient to attempt to obtain votes by denouncing the Mother Land. This is, for us, the most pleasing sign of the times that has appeared in the recent campaign.

It is pleasing, too, to note that Tammany has received a rebuke in the election of Colonel Roosevelt as Governor of New York, and that the Republicans have obtained, notwithstanding heavy Democratic gains in some quarters, a majority in both Houses of Congress. There never was a time in the history of the Great Republic when harmony between its executive and legislative bodies was more needed than it is today. Upon the top of all their domestic problems, the financial question, the currency question, the negro question, the question of the supremacy of law as against lynching and other forms of murderous and high-handed personal acts in defiance of law, are the questions arising out of the seizure of the Spanish Colonies. Under all these circumstances, a conflict of the parties engaged in the government of the United States would, at the present time, be a national calamity. For better or worse, the Great Republic has abandoned the Monroe Doctrine and has adopted the policy of "Expansion." It is needless to say that the changed conditions demand not only greater harmony, but also a higher type of statesmanship than has appeared in recent acts of Congress. Whether or not an improved class of politicians has been sent to represent the nation remains to be seen.

—It is pleasing to learn that another ocean steamer will give Charlottetown a call this fall.

—Notwithstanding the successful "saw-off" lately announced, no less than five supporters of the Hardy Administration in Ontario have been unseated for corrupt practices. This is very significant of Liberal purity.

Moncton Times: The revenue increase last month was about a quarter of a million but the expenditure increase was more than a million and a quarter. Mr. Tarte's speech should be revised to read, "We are making much, but we are spending more. And wait till you see us next year."
