Duped by American Sharpers.

An advertisement asking for a lady as office assistant, with a salary of \$600 per annum, with prepaid railway fare to Detroit, has appeared in some of the papers from time to time and has caused considerable annoyance and trouble. Detectives Grose and Carpenter thinking the thing a fraud, set to work to unravel the suspicious looking advertisement, and got a lady to answer it. She received a reply telling her to enclose about \$500, and that she could write to the parties given as references by the applicant. The letter wound up by telling the lady to address her next letter to a different place. A similar advertisement for a gentleman as office assistant appeared at the same time, which was answered by a young man at the request of the detectives. The Detroit police were communicated with and a letter was received from them stating that the advertisement was a fraud, and that those who put in the advertisements had branched all over the States. A number of Montreal people have been duped, and in some cases lost \$5 or \$10 through the fraud.—Witness.

Dining With The Queen.

Dining with the Queen is a great honor. Of course full court dress must be worn by the ladies. The gentlemen either wear their court dress or the Windsor uniform, which is really an ordinary dress, faced and cuffed with red silk, and adorned with gilt buttons instead of the ordinary black ones. The guests assemble before the Queen in a waiting room. This is the corridor the anteroom, but at Windsor a grand corridor is used for this purpose. They range themselves in two rows, the ladies on one side and the gentlemen on the other, and the persons of the highest rank are furthest from the door at which the Queen will enter. About nine o'clock the Queen appears, and when she has received the salutations from her guests, she passes down the two rows to the door of the state dining room and goes straight in to dinner. The guests converse among themselves in whispers, for it is not according to etiquette to speak up. From time to time the Queen speaks to one or two of her guests, but as it is not proper to disagree with her there is naturally not very much done in the way of conversation between Her Majesty and her subjects. Dinner usually lasts for an hour or so, after which the whole party adjourns to the drawing-room. Here the Queen makes some remarks to each guest in turn. This ended, the Queen returns to her private apartments, and the dining party is ended. It must be added, however, that dull as these entertainments are, there is not a single person who would seriously wish never to be present at one of the royal phases of the Queen in the highest social sphere that she can be conferred on a subject.—London Lady.

Jews Massacred.

LONDON, Feb. 28.—The scheme to smuggle Jews by wholesale out of Russia for emigration to the United States has, according to a Berlin dispatch, already resulted in bloodshed. The Russian authorities have been keeping a close watch for some time on the frontier of Prussian Silesia, and the Russian side of the boundary is patrolled by bodies of Cossacks on the lookout for any who may try to leave Russia without permission. A few days ago a force of Cossacks on the watch opposite the town of Myslowitz, in Prussian Silesia, discovered 300 emigrants crossing the frontier.

Several of them had already got within Prussian jurisdiction, and were therefore safe from the Cossacks, but the large majority were still on the Russian side of the line when the half savage cavalry of the Czar came dashing down upon them. The Cossacks speared them without mercy and trampled them under their horses, killing quite a number before the remainder allowed themselves to be driven back.

Dissolution of Imperial Commons.

LONDON, February 27.—Information reaching the Cabinet's discussion of a programme leading up to the dissolution of Parliament has reached the ministerial ranks, arousing increased expectancy of an appeal to the country in the autumn. Efforts to get a definite assurance from the members of the Cabinet have been met simply by advice to be ready. Secretary Balfour and President Ritchie, of the Local Government board, oppose the idea, the former d-d stringing forth the passages of an Irish local Government measure. Lord Salisbury is believed to favor the autumn as the fitting time to go to the country if he can settle the Behring Sea dispute with the United States. In the opinion of the Foreign office critical times are pending through the trouble in New found and the Egyptian occupation reaching a climax, which Lord Salisbury's Fabian tactics have hitherto averted. It is deemed impossible to protract negotiations with France. Another year must pass before a settlement injurious to the Government's reputation or a grave diplomatic collision with France.

The Daughter of Edwin Arnold.

The story of Sir Edwin Arnold's pretty daughter comes to us as follows:—It appears that during her recent visit with her father in Japan her Majesty's Chinese fleet were in the harbor of Yokohama at the same time Sir Edwin and his daughter entertained the admirals. Both of them at luncheon, and in return were naturally invited on board the ships. The American fleet was first visited, and up in leaving the gallant American admiral presented Miss Arnold with a beautiful bouquet tied with ribbons of the ship, as a token of the respect of himself and his officers. This American courtesy, came to the ears of the English commander, and not to be outdone by his American brother, he presented Miss Arnold with a larger bouquet and added the number of the ship. Then the American admiral sent Miss Arnold a few verses of his own composition. This was going a little further than the English officer was capable of, but he had some verses written to Miss Arnold and despatched them to her three days afterward.
