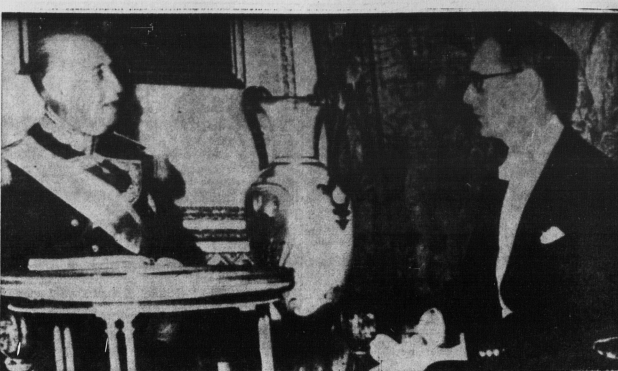


### Break Attempted At Cardigan Liquor Store

### A. J. Gaudet to Retire, Cox Seen As Successor

Deputy-Mayor Walter Cox has been named as a likely candidate in the municipal elections here next February to succeed Mayor Walthen Gaudet, who is announced yesterday he will not run for re-election except in an emergency.

Mr. Cox, chairman of the town planning committee, said he will not make a definite announcement until the next meeting of city council, Dec. 14.

He has become familiar with the duties of mayor through having occupied the chair on various occasions in the absence of Mayor Gaudet.

Long looked upon as the next candidate, Mr. Cox has delayed reaching a decision due to unexpected developments in connection with the private business with expansion necessary in the Pure Milk Company which he heads. This has been underway for some months for construction of a new plant on the outskirts of the city. However, other conditions have resulted in a change and because of this he had been unable to decide definitely.

**THREE FOLD TASK**  
He admitted that his main thought had been regarding the possibility of a three-fold task involving civic duties, business pressures and bringing up a family might see one or other of them suffer. For this reason he wanted to have "a trial house" in order before committing himself.

Mayor Gaudet, who is completing 11 years service to the city, feels it is time he stepped aside to make room for others. He served three terms on City Council and the past five years as chief magistrate.

City Council is expected to hold its next regular meeting December 14, which just happens to be the birthday of Councillor Cox. He may hold off his official announcement of his candidacy till then for sentimental reasons.

**PLAN INVESTIGATION**  
He said that an investigation would be carried out into the cause of the fire today by himself and Provincial Fire Marshal Carl MacLean. Chief Jewell is city fire marshal.
