CURE FOR PNEUMONIA.—A correspondent of an exchange sends the following as an old reliable cure for that dread disease, pneumonia: Take six to ten onions, according to size, and chop fine; put in a large spider over a hot fire; then add about the same quantity of rye meal, and vinegar enough to cover a thick paste. In the meantime stir it thoroughly, letting it simmer five or ten minutes. Then put in a cotton bag large enough to cover the lungs, and apply to the chest, as hot as the patient can bear. When this gets cool apply another, and thus continue by re-heating the poultice, and in a few hours the patient will be out of danger.

RAILWAY ACCIDENT.—Five cars of the accommodation train from Tignish jumped the track about 1 1/2 miles west of Miscouche, shortly after eleven yesterday morning. The engine and passenger coaches remained on the track. The train was made up of eleven freight and passenger cars. Conductor McKee was in charge, with Driver Hunter in the cab. Three of the five cars which went off are badly smashed and the other two are somewhat damaged. The track is also torn up as a result of the disaster. Fortunately the passenger coaches which contained a number of passengers, including Mr. L. E. Provost and consequently no person was injured. The cause of the disaster is not known. Some of the train hands think that it was due to the loosening of a wheel while others are of the opinion that the spreading of the rails by frost was the cause. The car that went off first was loaded with shingles for Mr. M. P. Hogan, of this city. At the time of the accident the train was going up grade and was probably not running at a greater speed than 12 miles an hour. The passengers were brought to the city last evening by the morning train from Charlottetown. Workmen were out yesterday afternoon and all last night repairing the damage, and everything is going along as usual to-day.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

A Grand Opening.

OTTAWA, May 1. The scene at the opening of Parliament here yesterday was a grand one. The weather was perfectly beautiful. There were thousands of people in attendance at the opening ceremonies, and the city is full of visitors. After reporting the Governor-General's Speech the House adjourned. The answer to the speech will be moved to-day by Hazen of St. John and seconded by Carbound of British Columbia. In the Senate Senator, Frowde moves the answer to the speech.

The Governor-General, in his speech, said that the season opened auspiciously, and that he had great hopes for the industries of the country and for a plentiful harvest. He referred to the action of the Government in reminding the United States Government last year of the willingness of Canada to extend and develop trade between this country and the United States. He also referred to the desire of this country for an adjustment of the international questions between the two countries which have not yet been settled. The United States, he said, have intimated to this Government that they are ready to consider the best means of settling those questions, and he hoped that the matter would result in an arrangement beneficial to both countries. With regard to the export cattle trade, His Excellency said that, in order to remove reasonable apprehension, a measure dealing with the subject of improper treatment of cattle will be brought forward. Our shipping, he was thankful to say, was free from any blame in this regard.

State Dinner at Ottawa. OTTAWA, May 1. The state dinner given at Government House last night was a most brilliant affair. After the dinner Lady Stanley entertained the wives and daughters of those who attended the state dinner.

May Day Will be Peaceful. LONDON, May 1. Telegrams from all the populous centres in western Europe indicate that May Day will pass quietly and without any serious disorder on the part of the laborers who parade on May Day. Labor manifestations will be no less memorable because they are conducted in an orderly manner.

Organized Labor. OTTAWA, May 1. The session promises to be a memorable one for legislation which will be brought forward in the interest of organized labor.

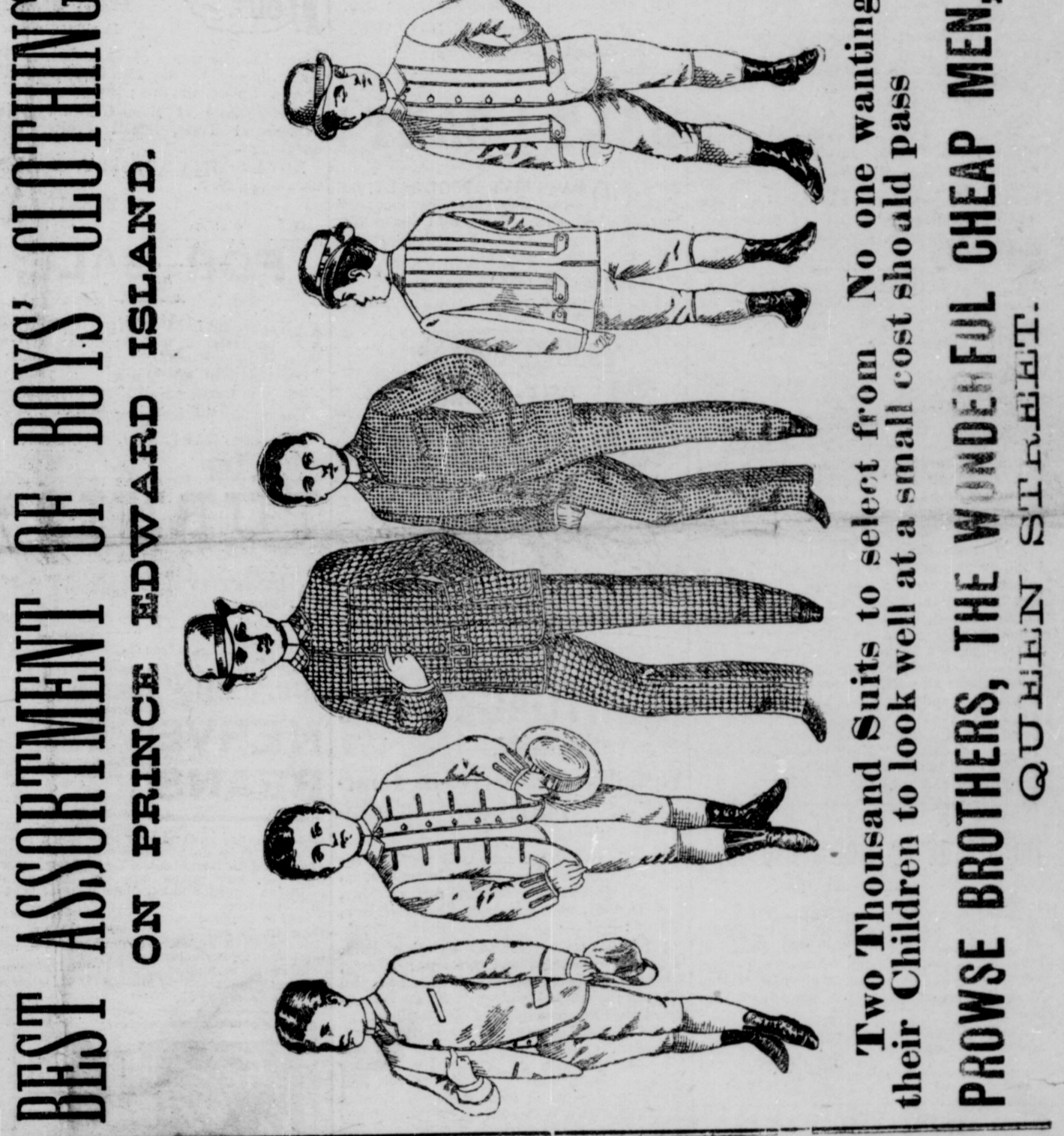
