

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Special dispatch to Examiner.

LONDON, Jan. 28.

It is stated that the Nationalists of the County Mayo, Ireland, intend to start Michael Davitt and Thomas Brennan, now under indictment for sedition, as candidates of the county at the approaching general election for seats in the House of Commons, on the understanding that, if elected, they shall abstain from taking their seats. The prospects of their election are considered good.

The "Standard's" Bombay despatch says it is generally believed that an army corps will advance to Herat, and that district will be transferred to Persia. All officers belonging to the Cabul Division now on leave, are ordered to rejoin their companies by March 15, when operations throughout Afghanistan will commence.

OTTAWA, Jan. 28.

Col. Fairgana and a surveying party have gone to make a survey of the canal at Little Current, Manitou Island, Lake Huron.

The Government have not accepted Mr. Wilmet's resignation yet. It is, however, unlikely that New Brunswick will continue to have two representatives in the Cabinet.

A Commission to enquire into the operation of mercantile agencies is spoken of.

The *Globe* printing scandal libel suit, in which it got a verdict, is the general topic of conversation. The exposure of the jobbery done in the Government printing is timely and effective. It is expected that public opinion will force the Government to reform the present system of disposing of printing tenders. The Government printers have protested notes which they gave Mr. Boyle's agent for the withdrawal of Boyle's tender. The verdict of the jury was unanimous in favor of the *Globe* Printing Co. It thereby condemned the whole of the parties to the nefarious transaction. Lieut Governor Cauchon married Miss LeMoine, of Ottawa, at Chicago yesterday.

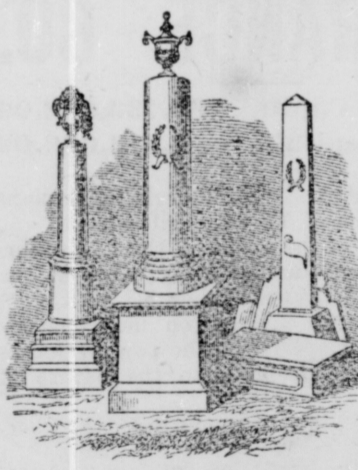
