

EXPLANATION NOT SATISFACTORY

S. Seeking Showdown on Wheat Pricing Issue

WASHINGTON (CP) — The United States is seeking a showdown with Canada on future wheat pricing policies and practices, a U.S. agricultural official disclosed Friday as he described Trade Minister Mitchell Sharp's explanation of Canadian policies as "satisfactory to Canada but not satisfactory to us."

He said the U.S. will make formal diplomatic representations to the Canadian government concerning Canada's "unacceptable" practices with a view to determining on the highest possible level what future consultation, if any, can be placed between the two countries on wheat export policies.

"By offering many long-term bulk deals at fixed prices, the wheat board has placed us behind the eight-ball in any attempt we want to make to encourage buyers to continue to look to Canada for future wheat supplies. Sharp expressed doubt that Red China and Russia would have purchased wheat from Canada if the board had not followed such a policy."

DEFENSES ACTION

Sharp also defended the board's action in secretly negotiating with Japan for an \$800,000-ton wheat sale at fixed prices. But the U.S. official said this was a "sneaky" deal undertaken by Canada without consulting the Canadians who are the beneficiaries of the deal.

The official said it was such tactics as the ones the wheat board had adopted in Japan that the U.S. government strongly opposed.
