DANIEL O'CONNELL.—A fair audience attended the lecture given in the Lyceum last night, by Mr. Chester B. MacNeill, on "Daniel O'Connell." The chair was occupied by Rev. A. E. Macanlay, President of the League of the Cross, under the auspices of which society the lecture was given. The lecture was exceedingly interesting and instructive. It consisted of a review of the life and work of the great Irish liberator, and was well written and distinctly read. At the close a hearty vote of thanks was tendered Mr. MacNeill for his able effort. The motion was made by Principal McSwain, of Queen Square School, and seconded by Edward Roche, Esq., both of whom made complimentary addresses. Mr. MacNeill replied in suitable terms.

POLICE COURT.—This morning a man was fined \$1.02 and costs for selling intoxicating liquor on Sunday. This is the third fine imposed this week. In each case the defendant confessed.

During the Month of March ending to day, there were 24 convictions for drunkenness against 21 for the corresponding month of last year; 1 conviction for malicious injury to property; 3 convictions for assault; 2 convictions for disorderly driving; 1 conviction for larceny; 7 convictions for breach of the Lord's Day Act, and 1 dismissal; 1 conviction for obtaining money by false pretences; 3 dismissals for nuisance. One man was sent up to the Supreme Court for trial on a charge of breaking jail. The receipts of the court amounted to \$181.34.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

RAILWAY MILEAGE

Our Militia Force.

The Newfoundland Difficulties, Etc.

OTTAWA, March 31.

In the House of Commons, Mr. Haggart replying to Mr. Davies said that the amount paid by the I. C. R. for mileage between Halifax and St. John was \$22,351, and the C. P. R. paid to the Intercolonial \$13,037.

Mr. Hughes, of North Victoria, moved for a return respecting the drilling of the active militia annually and other particulars regarding the military force. He advocated a return to the old system, and said that if our militia was not drilled annually it should be disbanded and the money saved. Mr. Bowell said that anything he could do to secure the efficiency of the force would be done. As to annual drill, all that was wanted was for Parliament to pass the necessary cost of doing so. Motion passed.

Hon. Mr. Davies moved for the correspondence which took place between Canada and Newfoundland on the question of the latter coming into the Dominion and also as to exchange free of duty of certain products of Canada and Newfoundland. In regard to the latter he blamed the Government for not issuing a proclamation enforcing the act passed in 1885 regarding the collection of duty on Newfoundland fish imported into Canada. They ought to have collected duty and enforced the act. Mr. McMillan, of Huron, delivered the speech which he intended to give on the Budget. He advocated direct taxation even if it costs \$15 per head. Dr. Sprout and Mr. Landrick followed. Hon. C. H. Tupper presented correspondence in reference to the difficulties between Canada and Newfoundland covering a period of five years. The correspondence is very bulky and shows clearly that the Dominion Government acted fairly and above board in all steps which were taken.
