Maine Congressman Urges Immigration Ban Lifting

NEW YORK (CP)—Republican congressman Stanley A. Tupper of Maine has urged the United States to amend its recently passed immigration law to allow unlimited immigration from Canada and Mexico.

"The state of Maine's culture had benefited greatly from immigrants from Quebec and the Maritime provinces," Tupper told the Maple Leaf dinner of the Canadian Society of New York.

The congressman said: "There is one vital distinction between Canada and Mexico and all the other nations of the world. They are the only two countries which border the United States—and in my opinion fully free and unlimited immigration between the United States and its immediate neighbors should be maintained."

Tupper said the immigration bill contains a serious flaw —

an annual limit of 120,000 immigrants from the Western Hemisphere that might seriously hinder the flow of immigrants into the U.S. from Canada and Mexico.

During the 1964 fiscal year, 139,284 persons emigrated from the Western Hemisphere countries to the U.S., he said. More than half of these came from "our immediate neighbors—38,074 from Canada and 32,967 from Mexico."

FEARS IMPACT

If the rate of Western Hemisphere immigration to the U.S. remains at this level, Tupper said, and if the bill is administered on a first-come-first-serve basis, "there is no assurance whatsoever that Canadian and Mexican immigration to the U.S. will not be affected."

He said he hoped the study commission which was to review the bill's likely effects would carefully consider the desirability of amending it before it went into effect in June 1968.

He urged civic groups throughout the U.S. to make a big effort to improve American understanding of Canadian culture, history and policy.

Tupper then went on to criticize President Johnson's failure to appoint a chairman of the U.S. section of the International Joint Commission with Canada.

"Throughout the 47-day American vacancy, the corresponding Canadian post has been filled by one of Canada's most outstanding public servants, Hon. A. D. P. Heeney, who on two occasions has been Canadian ambassador to the United States," said Tupper.

Tupper said the commission's technical studies prepared the way for international agreements on the St. Lawrence Seaway and the Columbia River Basin projects. He said today it is charged with examining the important problems of water pollution and decline in the water level of the Great Lakes.

"In these and its more routine tasks, the international joint commission is severely hampered without an American chairman," said Tupper.

15-Member Panel Named To Aid Canada Council

OTTAWA (CP)—Formation of a 15-member panel to advise the Canada Council on the needs of the academic community and to assist forming policies and programs was announced here by the council.

The panel, headed by Prof. John F. Graham of Dalhousie University's economics department, represents the humanities and social sciences.

One of its functions will be appraisal of applications for grants in aid of research and other special projects. The panel will also replace the council's former method of consultation for a final review of the scholarship and fellowship competitions in the humanities and social sciences.

The other panel members are: Albert Faucher and Rev. Clement Lockquell, Laval University; Maurice L'Abbe and Rev. Bernard Mailhot, University of Montreal; J. R. Mallory, McGill University; Dr. W. C. Hood, Bank of Canada, Ottawa; Prof. John A. Porter and arcel Trudel, Carleton University; Prof. T. A. Goudge and Prof. J. E. Hodgetts, University of Toronto; Prof. Malcolm M. Bpw, Trinity College, Toronto; Prof. W. L. Morton, University of Manitoba; Prof. Clarence Tracy, University of Saskatchewan and Prof. H. B. Hawthorn, University of British Columbia.

Formation of an advisory arts panel will be announced shortly the council said.

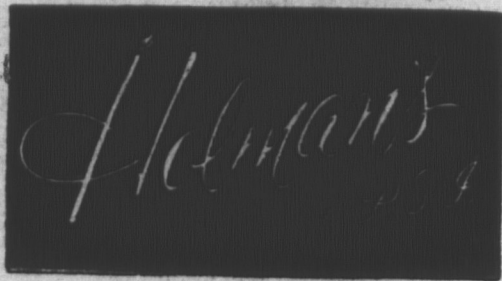
