ALLIE CARVER SCORES TWO

Flyers Dump Saints 5-1 To Grab Big Series Lead

Parkdale Flyers handed St. Dunstan's University a 5-1 lacing at the Sports Arena last night to take a commanding 3-1 lead in games in the best-of-seven finals for the Island Senior B. League crown.

Unlike the previous three games in the series the winners experienced little trouble throughout and after building up 2-0 bulge in the first frame coasted home on one more marker in the second and a pair in the third while holding the Saints to a single in the third.

Once again coach Allie Carver led the way with 2 goals. Skip Carver, Willie Dunn and Bob Hurry got the others.

The lone Saints goal was scored on a penalty shot by Paul (Buck) Davey and made the scoreboard read 4-1 at 9:29 of the third. The free try was awarded when Davey was held by Parkdale defenseman Barry Moore when he was trying to get around Moore for a clear breakaway.

Fifteen penalties were called by referee Moe Goodwin and Art Perry. Seven of them went to St. Dunstan's including a 10 minute misconduct to Rodney MacInnis in the third period. None of the penalties figured in the scoring.

For more than 49 minutes of the game Parkdale goalie Frank Roper was on his way to the first shut-out of the season in the Island League. He played standout hockey for the Flyers but was helped by some sloppiness on the part of the Saints who got around the Parkdale net by one or more of the outstanding players for Saints throughout the series.

He didn't register on the scoreboard last night but he turned in his usual sound game. Jim MacLeod demonstrated that he is one of the fastest players in the league. Arnold (Iron Man) Mullins played a lot of hockey for the Saints when he wasn't taking his regular turn with Miner MacDonald on the blue-line he was up front on right-wing killing off penalties.

Both teams were at full strength however when Skip Carver put ed from a pileup in front of the net. Assistants were credited to Allie Carver and Bob Hurry.

At 2:20 of the third Allie Carver got his second goal. Hurry picked up the puck in the corner and relayed to Carver standing all alone in front of the net and the Parkdale coach made good on his back-hand.

The penalty shot that gave the Saints their only goal of the game came at 9:29. Moore got a grip on Davey as the fleet Saints rightwinger was breaking into the clear and knocked the stick out of his hand. In scoring the goal Davey skated right in on Roper pulled him to one side and dumped the disc into the twines.

Hurry got the last goal of the game at 10:44 when he blasted in Canada Carver's passout from behind the net.

CHIT - CHAT - The Saints didn't seem to be the same team that played in the first three games. Their combination plays weren't clicking and their sides called against them were too numerous to mention. Ed MacDonald has been one of the outstanding players for Saints throughout the series.

Maroons-Beavers Take Rest Before Tonight's Big Game

CHATHAM Ont. (CP) - Saint John Beavers and Chatham Maroons took it easy Tuesday, figuring a good rest was better than a practice as they awaited the fourth game of their Eastern Canada Allan Cup final series.

Neither Beavers, champions of the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League, nor Maroons held drills Tuesday. Maroons lead the best-of-seven series 2-1, with the fourth game scheduled here tomorrow.

Both coach Murph Chamberlain of Maroons, all-Ontario senior hockey champions, and playing coach Steve Brklacich looked on tonight's engagement as a key game.

"We have to win this one," said Brklacich.

Commented Chamberlain: "We realize the importance of this one. We hope to win it." A Maroon triumph would give them a stranglehold on the series. On the other hand, a Beaver victory would make things mighty interesting. Beavers won the first game here last Thursday 5-4. They lost the next two by 5-3 and 6-3.

WORRY ABOUT PENALTIES
Meanwhile, there were reports that Beaver players were worried about the number of penalties so far in the series. In the first two games, Brklacich, who leads the penalty parade, was given 10 minor penalties and a 10-minute misconduct sentence. He did not get a penalty Monday night.

In three games, Beavers have picked up a total of 39 penalties. Maroons have had 26.

Landy To Run In The U.S.

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) - John Landy, the world mile record holder who has broken the four-minute barrier in four of his last five attempts, announced Tuesday he would run two races in the United States "and I would dearly love to break the four-minute mile there."

Landy, whose 3:58 stands as the world record, said he would run in Los Angeles May 5 and in the west coast relay in San Francisco.

He said his American races would be his final competitive appearances before a winter in Australia, a layoff which will precede his intensive Olympic preparations.

Landy added that he had received "dozens" of invitations to race in the United States, and added that after his 3:58 effort last week here, he felt his form warrants an appearance in the U. S.
