MAILS - The St. Lawrence left Point du Chene on return to Summerside at eight o'clock last evening, but it was not until eleven o'clock that she got clear of the ice. When she arrived off Summerside Captain Cameron found the harbor frozen over. He, in consequence, started for Charlottetown, arriving about two this afternoon.

IT IS REPORTED that the docks at Georgetown and Lower Montague have been damaged by the late storm, and that Sturgeon Bridge has been almost entirely carried away. St. Peter's Bay Bridge is also reported as having been rendered almost impassable. The approaches to the Rocky Point wharf have also been injured, but men are to-day engaged making good the damage.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Parnell's Position.

STILL UNDECIDED.

A FURTHER POSTPONEMENT

LONDON, Dec. 2.

The meeting of the Irish members of the Commons to consider the advisability of removing Parnell from the leadership of the Nationalist party, was resumed at noon to-day. All hopes of the Nationalist meeting reaching a decision of the main issue to-day have been abandoned, and it is understood that no stone will be left unturned to postpone indefinitely the question of Parnell's retirement.

The Storm.

HALIFAX, Dec. 2. The schr. Lady Franklin, with general cargo, when lying in the stream yesterday dragged her anchors, and to prevent being driven out to sea, endeavored to find shelter in the Cove of Meagher's Beach, but went ashore, and will be a total wreck.

Considerable damage is reported from the storm at Canso. The vessels that went ashore were the Ryan, Lida and Lizzie, Hector and Euxine. The Ryan got off at high tide with but little damage. The Hector with top damaged by collision with the Lida and Lizzie and two others also got all at, leaking badly. The Lida and Lizzie are still ashore leaking badly. The Euxine, produce laden from P. E. Island for Halifax, is yet aground and leaking badly. A Port Hawkesbury despatch says yesterday's gale was most terrific. The schooners Marie, Empressine, Ottawa, Granada and Lida Linwood were driven ashore, but all will be got off with more or less damage. At Langan, the American schooner Alice was wrecked, but the crew were saved.

Additional Facilities.

MONTREAL, Dec. 2. Instructions have been received from the C. P. R. at Winnipeg by General Supt. White, to prepare for the erection of twenty warehouses throughout Manitoba. It is explained that the action of the C. P. R. in this matter is owing to the unsatisfactory prices paid by dealers, and farmers are thus afforded additional facilities for storing their grain.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Dec. 2. Sir Charles Tupper cabled Hon. Mr. Carling to-day that the Imperial authorities had decided not to allow the steamship Lida to land cattle in Great Britain in future. This vessel lost 354 head on her last voyage.

Adam Brown has received a cable from Superintendent Dimock, announcing the arrival at Jamaica of the first cargo of exhibits.

The Springhill Strike Over.

SPRINGHILL MINES, Dec. 2. The little strike is over. At four o'clock this afternoon the committee of the boys waited on Manager Sweet, and stated that they would all resume work to-morrow morning unconditionally. The loss in wages caused by the stoppage will be about \$5,000.

The Coroner's Verdict.

FREDERICTON, Dec. 2. The coroner's inquest into the cause of the death of Mrs. J. H. Bridges, of St. Mary's, resulted in a verdict of death by strychnine while in a fit of temporary despondency.

Bishop Courtney Ill.

HALIFAX, Dec. 2. Bishop Courtney is still dangerously ill. He was unconscious most of the time, but to-night his physicians reports his condition slightly improved.

Labor Troubles.

HAVERHILL, MASS., Dec. 2. The labor trouble at Woodbury Bros., shoe factory has been adjusted, and the men who have now been out eight days can return to work.

MONTREAL, Dec. 2. The Canadian Pacific Railway has removed its European office from Liverpool to London. The Liverpool office will be continued as a sub-agency.
