Six Killed When Two R.C.A.F. Planes Collide Near Winnipeg

Surgeon's Skill Saves Sergeant

WEGBERG West Germany (Reuters)—A surgeon's skill has saved the life of a British sergeant whose unique injuries from an automobile crash caused his body to swell up to an "enormous size."

One attending doctor said chest and windpipe injuries, allowing air to leak into the body tissues, had swollen Sgt. Ronald M. Field, 25, "until he looked like a man in an inflated diving suit."

John Bickford, one of Britain's leading chest surgeons, flew from his home in Liverpool to this British base in Germany. Surgeons assisting Bickford said after the operation early Friday that the sergeant has "a good chance of pulling through now." They described his case as unique in medical history.

Britain May Be On Verge Of A-Bomb Defence

By TERENCE DOWNEY PERTH, Australia, (Reuters) - Observers at Wednesday's nuclear test in the Monte Bello islands believe Britain may be on the verge of achieving a defence against the atom bomb.

They believe the test was an experiment with a small tactical weapon—small enough to be used as a warhead in guided defence missiles.

The observers also believe that the test was designed not to show what the Monte Bello weapon could do, but what it could not do. Among apparent inconsistencies which first puzzled the observers at the test was the fact that no structures were built to test the destructive power of the weapon. Its effects were recorded only on scientific instruments.

LITTLE RADIOACTIVITY

The radioactivity from the weapon was comparatively small, and was quickly dispersed. This would be necessary for a defensive weapon, which would be detonated close to any homeland being defended.

Britain has already demonstrated a small air-to-air guided missile—the Fairey Fireflash—and has announced that large-scale work will be undertaken at the Woormera rocket range of missiles which will require the whole of the 1,500 miles of the Australian desert range for testing.

The pattern of Wednesday's test at Monte Bello, and these reported plans at Woormera, all indicate to observers that Britain is preparing to test a guided missile of great range and height, capable of carrying an atomic warhead.

There have been unconfirmed reports that the Eisenhower administration has been split on the question of just what approach it should take.

Harold Stassen, President Eisenhower's special adviser on disarmament, discussed the Moscow announcement at a press conference Friday during which he announced the Russian move will be reviewed by a special eight-man panel of nuclear, military and industrial leaders starting May 29.

Stassen, in his remarks, gave evidence that he is much less skeptical about the Soviet action than other officials. He said it could be "a desirable dividend" for President Eisenhower's peace policy.

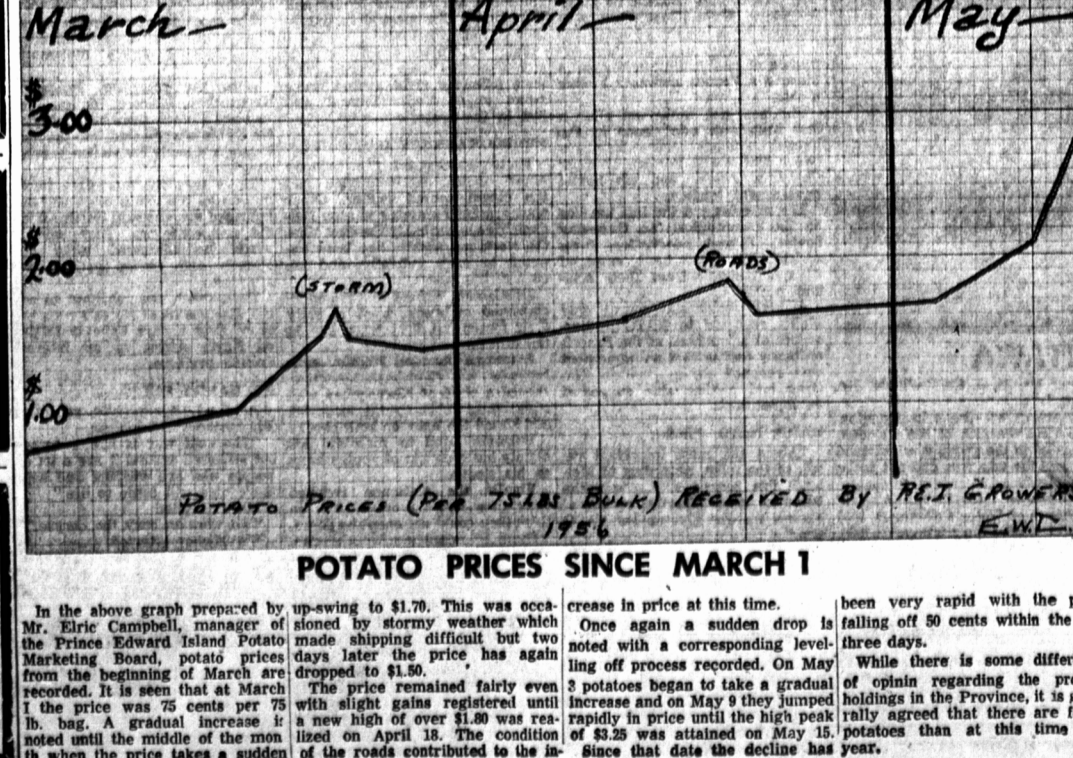

POTATO PRICES SINCE MARCH 1. In the above graph prepared by Mr. Elic Campbell, manager of the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board, potato prices from the beginning of March are recorded. It is seen that at March the price was 75 cents per 100 lbs. A gradual increase followed until the middle of the month when the price takes a sudden up-swing to \$1.70. This was occasioned by stormy weather which made shipping difficult but two days later the price has again dropped to \$1.50. The price remained fairly even with slight gains registered until a new high of over \$1.80 was reached on April 18. The condition of the roads contributed to the increase in price at this time. Once again a sudden drop is noted with a corresponding leveling off of process recorded. On May 3 potatoes began to take a gradual increase and on May 9 they jumped rapidly in price until the high peak of \$3.25 was attained on May 15. Since that date the decline has been very rapid with the price falling off 50 cents within the last three days. While there is some difference of opinion regarding the present holdings in the Province, it is generally agreed that there are fewer potatoes than at this time last year.
