## Hon. Gordon Bennett Is Acting Premier

Hon. Gordon Bennett, minister of education has been named acting premier in the absence of Hon. Alex B. Campbell. Premier Campbell is attending the national Liberal conference in Ottawa.

According to Mr. Bennett the weekly cabinet meeting is to be held today starting at 1:30 p.m.

Commenting on the Cabinet meeting to be held in Alberton on October 16, Mr. Bennett said that prior to this Cabinet session arrangement has been made for three members of the government who are also members of the housing authority to meet with the mayor of Summerside, George Key, and other Summerside citizens concerned with the housing situation in Summerside.

"The corporation is very anxious to assess the need for low

rental housing in the Summerside area and wishes to discuss any background information that has already been procured through surveys made in the area," stated Mr. Bennett.

Those meeting with Summerside representatives will be Hon. Keir Clark, minister of health and municipal affairs; Hon. Lorne Bonnell, minister of welfare and tourism; Education Minister Bennett, T. Earl Hickley, provincial secretary and treasurer; and Premier Alex Campbell.

### Preliminary Hearing Sees Accused Remanded

Five men were remanded until Thursday when they appeared yesterday at a preliminary hearing into charges of escaping from the Prince County Jail last Wednesday morning.

The four—Roy Joseph Bernard, Wellington; Allan Joseph Cormier, St. Eleanor's; Albin Keith Williams, Springhill, P.E. Island; and John Joseph Aubin Gallant, Howlan, had pleaded not guilty and elected trial by judge without a jury when they appeared Friday.

Gallant and Cormier were serving sentences for car theft, and Williams was in on a break, enter, and theft charge. Bernard, the four's spokesman, was serving 30 days on an illegal possession charge.

Cst. Bishop, said that he was called to the jail on the early afternoon of October 5, and that he was met by several members of the Summerside town police.

### LOOT UNCOVERED

He said that he searched the jail and checked the rear cells, found three or four quarts of liquor in pop bottles, and four or five cartons of cigarettes, which he turned over to the Summerside police for their investigation of break, enter, and theft.

He told the court that the bars on the north side of the jail were slightly out of shape, and the paint was chipped near the center.

### PRISONERS QUESTIONED

On October 6, Bernard was questioned, Cst. Bishop said. There were six or seven other prisoners also interviewed, he stated.

Bernard asked Cst. Bishop whether he had told the four that it would be charged with possession of stolen goods. Cst. Bishop denied that he had said this. Bernard claimed that the four might as well admit it to get the others off the hook.

Jailer Stewart Berry told the court that on the day in question all four were under warrants of committal. They were confined to a room, which had been recently made into a cell block. He said that there was free access from one room to the other, with a bathroom in between.

**EIGHT IN ROOM**

Eight were in one big room—a former store room—and another was in the trustees room, he said. The windows on the trustees room are covered with a screen, he said. The room from where the alleged escape took place had bars on its windows.

### Lord Tedder Has Criticism Of Beaverbrook's War Job

LONDON (CP)—Lord Tedder said the late Lord Beaverbrook ruled the air ministry through force and fear and that this department vital to aircraft production, was chaotic during the Second World War, gravely threatening RAF efficiency.

Lord Tedder, an RAF marshal who was research director days of the war said the Canadian-born Beaverbrook did a by rigging up heads of aircraft companies at 3 a.m., demanding to know why they were loafing in bed when fighting crews were battling for their lives in the air.

"Did Beaverbrook really win the Battle of Britain by pouring out hundreds more Spitfires, or was it the reverse?" asks Tedder in his memoirs, With Prejudice, published by Cassel, and Company.

"My first answer to the story of 3 o'clock in the morning is to say that I think the shock treatment was worth a lot. As for the remainder of the Beaverbrook regime, that is very different.

Tedder, who later became a commander-in-chief in the Middle East and deputy to Dwight Eisenhower, the Allied supreme commander says that when he quit the department in 1950 he wrote the junior air minister complaining that development projects were being turned over to persons with no service knowledge.

### Minister Announces Sponsorship

It has been announced by Hon. J. Elmer Blanchard, minister of labor that in keeping with former years the Campbell government will again sponsor the Municipal Winter Works Incentive Program. The program which will begin on November 1st will entitle communities both organized and un-organized to participate in federal provincial sharing up to the extent of 90 per cent of the amount paid out in bona fida wages to workers.

The Program is primarily designed to increase employment during the quieter months of the year and the period during which eligible projects can be worked on extends from November 1st to April 30th.

The Secondary object of the program this year will be to enable communities to improve their public buildings such as halls, rinks, libraries, fire halls, etc., and also to erect recreational facilities, public buildings of various kinds and even undertake projects during Centennial Year which will be of historic interest.

Already considerable interest has been displayed, the department reports, in projects for the

coming year and requests have been received for approval of such projects as community rinks, fire halls, sewage systems beautifying of streets and roads, side through communities, building of bath houses, renovation of village halls, etc.

Every co-operation will be given to communities by officials of the department, stated M.R. Blanchard.

### \$125 Fine Is Levied

Calvin James MacPhail, Bonshaw, was fined \$125 and costs or 30 days when he appeared before Magistrate A. James Haslam, QC, on an impaired driving charge in City Police Court yesterday.

### Prison Term Imposed

**SUMMERSIDE** — An Antigonish County, Nova Scotia youth, John Wayne MacPherson who had pleaded guilty to two charges of break, enter, and theft on October 4, was sentenced on both to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary when he appeared before Provincial Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald here Tuesday.

The Georgeville, N.S. youth was charged with a dwelling house break and a break into a store. Both sentences will run concurrently.

Francis Joseph Perry of Miscouche was sentenced to one month in Prince County Jail on a charge of theft. The original charge had been theft over \$50, but this was changed to theft under \$50. Perry was charged with theft of cheques, valued over \$50, but when he appeared October 4, doubt had been raised to the exact value of the cheques, since they had not been

ashed. The sentence in the local lockup is retroactive to the date of his arrest.

John Edgar Arsenault of Abram's Village pleaded guilty to common assault. Magistrate MacDonald sentenced Arsenault to two months in the Prince County Jail on the charge.
