[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Reorganization of the Dominion Government. OTTAWA, Sept. 25. The Dominion Government has been reorganized as follows:— Rt. Hon. Sir John A. Macdonald, K. C. G. B., Premier and President of the Council. Hon. Sir Leonard Tilley, Minister of Finance. Hon. John Henry Pope, Minister of Railways and Canals. Hon. Sir Hector Langevin, Minister of Public Works. Hon. Sir A. P. Caron, Minister of Militia. Hon. John Costigan, Minister of Inland Revenue. Hon. Thomas White, Minister of the Interior. Hon. John Carling, Minister of Agriculture. Hon. Sir Alex. Campbell, Postmaster General. Hon. McKenzie Bowell, Minister of Customs. Hon. A. W. McLellan, Minister of Marine and Fisheries. Hon. J. A. Chapleau, Secretary of State. Hon. J. S. D. Thompson, Minister of Justice. Hon. John Carling was Minister of Agriculture in the first Provincial Government of Ontario, of which John Sandfield McDermid was leader. He originated the idea of the Ontario Agricultural College, and obtained the first grant for the purpose. He is also the father of the Ontario Free Land and Homestead Act, and is therefore no novice in the Department of which he now takes charge. Wandering Spirit to be Hanged. BATTLEFORD, Sept. 25. Chief Wandering Spirit pleaded guilty to the murder of Agent Quinn, at Frog Lake, and was sentenced to be hanged on the 27th November. GRAND Colonial Exhibition in London, Eng., 1886. FIFTY-FOUR THOUSAND FEET RESERVED FOR CANADA. FIRST ROYAL EXHIBITION COMMISSION SINCE 1862. THE COLONIAL AND INDIAN EXHIBITION to be held in LONDON, England, commencing MAY 1st, 1886, is intended to be on a scale of great magnitude, having for object to mark an epoch in the relations of all the parts of the British Empire with each other. 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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR. The Lady's "Day." SIR,—Could not this useful custom be adopted sometimes in the matter of "receiving" the poor, who are often such a trouble at our kitchen doors, where they find the servants too busy to listen to their tale? Why not tell them that one day in each week they will be received at the hall door, where the family can speak a kind word to them, and see their wants supplied? A case in point is that of a very infirm old woman and her invalid daughter, who are worthy objects of charity. They were told by the wife of a leading Barrister here, that they should be supplied daily with milk—a necessity for the poor mother. Things went wrong in the kitchen, and they, not liking to complain of the servants, stopped sending for it. Then, one of our physicians found them by chance, and after supplying their present necessities from his own pocket, told them to go to his house every day for new milk. They sent one; but, the kitchen being made too hot for the kind neighbor who went for it, they never sent again. Servants are not to blame, even the best, because attending to the poor is not their work. Why subject our needy brothers and sisters to their thoughtless caprice!
