**Canada's Indictment AGAINST THE Laurier Government**

9. That the Laurier Government has at one stroke destroyed the Binder Twine industry in Canada and doubled the price of twine to the Canadian farmer.  
10. That the Laurier Government, has delivered the Coal Oil industry of Canada into the hands of the Standard Oil Trust of the United States, and has increased the cost of coal oil to the Canadian consumer by 62 per cent.  
11. That the Laurier Government, wasted \$250,000 of public money in holding a Prohibition Plebiscite, which had no other purpose than to deceive and humbug the electors of Canada.  
12. That the Laurier Government tried to give away about four million acres of gold lands, worth twenty millions of dollars, as the price of building 150 miles of narrow gauge railway in the Yukon territory.  
13. That the Laurier Government tried to pay \$800,000 more for the Drummond County Railway than was actually paid for it, thanks to the public spirited action of the Senate.  
14. That the Laurier Government has tolerated the most notorious corruption and incapacity in connection with the Yukon administration, and has prevented persistently any adequate investigation into charges made in this connection in Parliament.  
15. That the Laurier Government by its bungling has prevented Canada from obtaining a line of fast Atlantic steamships for the popularizing of the Canadian ocean route.  
16. That the Laurier Government has encouraged the grossest and most systematic election frauds by condoning offences and promoting offenders.  
17. That the Laurier Government, through its general incapacity, has prevented Canada from obtaining its due share of the prosperity prevailing throughout the world.

TO THE JURY:  
Turn out the party that has ruthlessly broken its pledges, and if the successors defy public opinion turn them out, too. Thus will the people command respect and come to be the real rulers.

**Sir Louis Davies and the Secrecy of the Ballot.**

This section of the Dominion Election Act was in the bill as it was introduced by the Government of which Sir Louis is a member; and the Patriot declares that it "practically destroys the secrecy of the ballot."  
"In the Province of Prince Edward Island, if any person desires to vote, whose right to vote is objected to on the ground of want of qualification, and if a candidate or any agent of a candidate or (in the absence of such agent) any elector acting in the interest of a candidate, so objects in the presence of the elector, the deputy returning officer in addition to placing his initials on the back of the ballot paper, as provided by section 70, shall also place on the back thereof a number corresponding to that placed opposite the voter's name on the poll book.  
Here are sub-sections 5 and 8 of section 96, safeguarding the secrecy of the ballot, with Sir Louis Davies' attempted amendment in italics:—  
Sub section 5. No candidate, officer, clerk, agent or any other person shall communicate at any time to any person any information as to the number on the back of the ballot paper given to any voter at a polling station, except to a court or judge lawfully requiring him so to do or attempt to ascertain at the counting of votes the number on the back of any ballot paper; *but this provision shall not apply to a ballot marked in accordance with sections 67 and 74 of this Act.*  
Sub sec. 8. Everyone who violates any of the provisions of this section shall be guilty of an indictable offence, and liable to a penalty not exceeding two hundred dollars, and to imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months, with or without hard labor, in default of payment of such penalty.

**THE PROHIBITION MATTER.**  
Baptist Conference Condemns the Government.  
St. J. N., Oct. 10.—The Free Baptist conference in session yesterday has unanimously adopted a temperance report condemning the government for disregarding the mandate of the electorate in the prohibition and condemning parliament for adopting the Prohibition motion, declaring that a prohibitory law should not be enacted. The conference recommends efforts in party caucuses to have prohibitionists nominated as candidates for legislative bodies.

**WANT KITCHENER BANISHED.**

The war office has not confirmed the report that Lord Roberts will leave South Africa the last week in October. Officials intimate that there are several important matters unsettled. The important one without doubt is the succession to the command, Official there are silent and it is believed that the new commander-in-chief has been asked to name his own successor. The choice probably lies between General Buller and Lord Kitchener with Major-General Hunter as a substitute. Both are reluctant to remain in charge of the police work. Buller, according to the latest despatches, is still pressing north in pursuit of the remnant of the Boer army beyond Pilgrim's Rest. Wits in the military clubs are cracking jokes at his expense and asserting that he is surveying a new line for the Cape to Cairo railway. Buller has no remarkable talents for details of military administration and this quality would be most useful in effecting a pacification of the two new colonies and bringing about a restoration of public order. Kitchener is a man of iron will who would be stern and relentless in dealing with the lawless. His appointment to the chief command will be welcomed by Englishmen who have grown impatient over prolonged delays in the military operations. Buller outranks everyone in South Africa, except Lord Roberts. Kitchener has made many enemies among officers during his campaign. He has upset the regular transport service and shown no mercy for incompetent officers. His appointment as adjutant general would be the strongest possible assurance that the British military system would be reformed at the weakest point, the discipline of officers. Military men in London are naturally opposed to the general shaking up which would follow his transfer to headquarters in London and they prefer to have him sent to India or put in command at Pretoria. The Marquis of Salisbury has little enthusiasm, but he is known to admire Kitchener intensely. He sent Kitchener to South Africa and may bring him back to London. Premature accounts of the reception to colonial soldiers are published, but not with adequate authority. The number of visiting troops is likely to be considerably less than 6,000. Time will be required for the selection of a thoroughly representative body of Canadian. Australian and South African veterans. Canada will have the largest contingent and everything will be done to render the reception memorable.

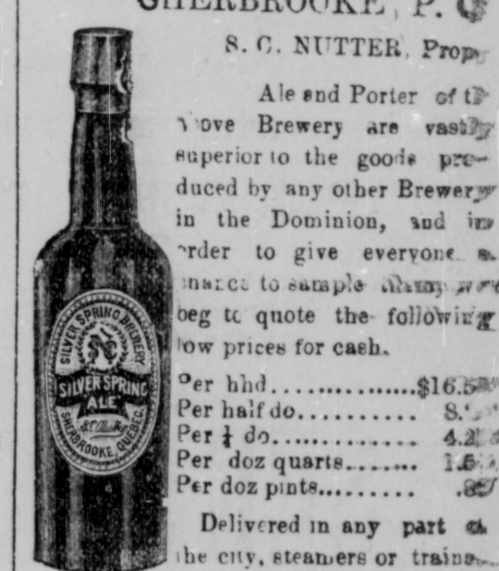
