His remains were laid to rest in the Geddie Memorial Church yard.

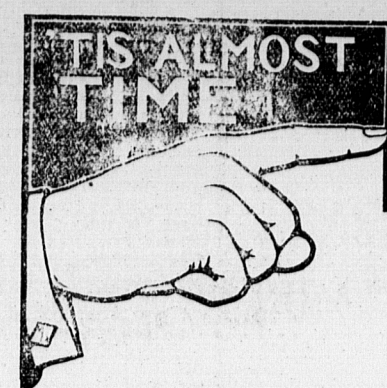
