Fixed Light on East Point.

THE Government of Prince Edward Island has given Notice, that on and after the 10th day of JULY, 1867, a light will be exhibited from a Lighthouse recently erected on East Point, Prince Edward Island.

The light will be a *fixed* white light, at an elevation of 130 feet above the level of high water, and in clear weather should be seen at a distance of 18 miles.

The tower is octagonal, white, 60 feet high from base to vane, and stands 200 yards in shore from the south side of the point, and in lat. $46^{\circ} 27' 9''$ N., long. $61^{\circ} 58' 15''$ West of Greenwich.

A PROCLAMATION

BY HIS EXCELLENCY

GEORGE DUNDAS, ESQUIRE,

Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral, and Ordinary of the same, &c. &c. &c.

GEORGE DUNDAS, Lieut. Governor.

WHEREAS His Worship the Mayor of the City of Charlottetown hath, on account of the recent fires which have taken place in this City, and which are supposed to be the work of Incendiaries, expressed to me his apprehension of impending danger from Incendiarism to this City, and his desire that a suitable reward be offered for the detection and punishment of any person or persons who shall hereafter be guilty of any act or acts of Incendiarism: I have thought fit, by and with the advice and consent of Her Majesty's Council, to proclaim, and I do hereby proclaim and offer a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS to any person or persons (not the actual party to the act) who will give such information and evidence as will lead to the discovery, apprehension and conviction of any person or persons who shall hereafter be guilty of any act or acts of Incendiarism.

Given under my hand and the Great Seal of this Island, at Charlottetown, in the said Island, this Fourth day of September, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and in the thirty-first year of Her Majesty's reign.

HIS Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council was this day pleased to fix and determine the rate at which the amount of the Invoice of Dutiable Goods, imported into this Island from the United States of America, shall, in estimating the duties payable thereon, be reduced into current money of the Island, as follows:—

In all cases where such Invoices shall be made out in Dollars and Cents of the paper currency of the United States, the amount of such Invoice shall be reduced into current money of this Island, by allowing for each Dollar the sum of FOUR SHILLINGS AND SIX-PENCE, and in the like proportion for any fraction of a Dollar; of which all Collectors of Impost are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.
