THE application for a writ of certiorari, to quash the verdict of wilful murder brought against the policemen who did the shooting at the Mitchellstown riot, has been granted.

A YOUNG man named William Burton committed suicide at North-east Margaree a few days ago by hanging himself from the limb of a tree. The cause of the rash act is unknown.

MR. HOWARD, the popular representative of the Montreal News Company, who has been in the city for several days past receiving orders for the firm, left for home this morning.

THE Hackett-Perry election case will be heard before the Supreme Court of Canada on Tuesday next. Messrs. Hodgson and Peters are now on their way to Ottawa to argue the appeal.

THE horse-whipping craze appears to have hit New Glasgow pretty hard. The third case within a few weeks took place on Thursday when a milkman publicly chastised a customer who refused to pay his bill.

MR. BURWASH, brother of Prof. Burwash, of Mount Allison, is Professor of Theology at Victoria, and is spoken of as the probable successor of Dr. Nelles, late Chancellor of Victoria University, Cobourg.

A DESPATCH from Toronto is to the effect that Philip E. Hartz, a converted convict, absconded to the United States with a large sum belonging to the Willard Tract Depository, of which he was cashier. His defalcations will reach thousands of dollars.

THE fare from Charlottetown to Boston, for the remainder of the season will be as follows: Cabin, \$3.50; stateroom berth, \$8.50—a reduction of \$1 in each case. One of the steamers will leave here for Boston every Thursday evening at 4 o'clock; and Boston for Charlottetown every Saturday afternoon.

A NUMBER of ladies interested in Queen Squa e Gardens met in the Legislative Library yesterday and formed themselves into collecting committees. The city was divided into some ten or twelve sections and several canvassers were allotted to each. The ladies will enter upon their duties at once.

MEASLES are no respecter of persons. A recent despatch from Copenhagen reports that the Princess Maud and the Princess Louise, daughters of the Prince of Wales, are both suffering from an attack of this somewhat ubiquitous complaint. The Czarevitch and Prince George of Greece, who are visiting there, have also been attacked.

THE schooner Jennie cleared for Boston this morning with a cargo of potatoes shipped by the following parties: Jas. W. Merrill, 876 bags, or 2,628 bushels; P. McKeever (McKeever & Hall) 323 bags, or 969 bushels; L. S. Kimball & Co., 241 bags, or 693 bushels—a total cargo of 4,194 bushels. In another schooner is now on the berth and will be loaded by the same parties for the same market.

By advertisement in another column, it will be seen that the Scottish Union and National Insurance Company has opened an agency in Charlottetown. THE clergy of the Church of England meet in Craupaud, by invitation of the Rector, on Wednesday, 26th inst. There will be a Missionary Meeting in the Springfield Church on Tuesday evening, 27th inst. A number of the clergy will speak. In Craupaud, on Wednesday, there will be Matins and Holy Communion at 11 a.m.; meeting of clergy at 2 p.m.; public meeting in St. John's Church at 7 p.m. All the clergy are expected to speak. Carriages will be at County Line at 8 a.m., to convey the clergy to the Rectory, Craupaud. Every attention will be paid to the comfort of visiting clergymen.

A HEAVY easterly gale, accompanied with rain, set in about six o'clock last evening. During the night the wind veered round, as the south-west, and by one o'clock this morning it blew a hurricane. Around the wharves vessels had much difficulty in keeping their moorings. The str. Miranichi left Summerside last evening for Charlottetown; but had to come to anchor, just outside the harbor. Shortly after she dragged anchor and went ashore on Misouche Shoals. At high tide to-day she was still ashore, and it is not known what chances were used for her being got off.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Inter-Provincial Conference.

QUEBEC, Oct. 21. The Inter-Provincial Conference met at 11 o'clock this a. m., and had an uninterrupted sitting until 1 o'clock. All the delegates then partook of luncheon, as guests of Hon. Mr. Mercier. Several members were buttonholed as they left the conference hall, but they positively declined to give any information, explaining that it had been decided to keep the proceedings secret. It has, however, been learned that Mr. Norquay, Premier of Manitoba, protested against the Federal Government's disallowance of the Red River bill, and that his protest received the unanimous endorsement of the conference. Over 1,000 people attended the reception given to-night in Parliament House by Hon. Mr. and Mrs. Mercier to the inter-provincial conference delegates. The reception is said to have been the grandest ever given in the ancient capital.

The Loss of the City of Montreal.

LONDON, Oct. 21. The Board of Trade has made inquiry into the loss of the human line steamer City of Montreal, which was burned at sea Aug 10th, on a voyage from New York to Liverpool. It decides that neither the owners nor officers were blameable, and that the cotton in the steamer's cargo, in which the fire was first discovered, was not properly packed.

A New Paper.

TORONTO, Oct. 21. A morning paper gives currency to the report that J. D. Edgar, M. P., and others, being dissatisfied with the policy of the Globe, are moving to start a new morning paper, in opposition to the Globe. It is stated that all they are now waiting for is to get Sir Richard Cartwright to put up the money, and they then propose to ask Gordon Brown to take charge.

A Terrible Death.

ESSEX CENTRE, Oct. 21. Arthur Gillis, a millright, suffered a terrible death here this morning in Bickle & Dyson's grist mills. When attempting to put on a belt while the machinery was in motion, he was tripped by another belt. In falling his head was caught by two enormous cogwheels and literally ground from his body.

The Alien Labor Act.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21. The suit against the Church of the Holy Trinity for employing Rev. E. Walpole, late of England, as pastor, intended to test the contract alien labor act, was begun to-day.

Archbishop Walsh's Proposals.

DUBLIN, Oct. 21. A committee of the landlords association to-day decided in favor of Archbishop Walsh's new proposals for a conference with the delegates of tenants.

Floods Increasing.

HAVANA, Oct. 21. The floods at Roque are increasing. A number of plantations and several estates are totally submerged.

A DELIBERATE attempt at train-wrecking is reported from Fredericton. On Wednesday last when the train was a short distance beyond Glazier's Station, the driver noticed a spike on the rail. The spike was removed and the train proceeded on its way. Further on a piece of fish-plate was found on the rail, and at other points beyond, across the rails were found a sleeper, several stones, and a new steel rail. There is no clue to the perpetrator of the dastardly acts, but it is supposed that the accidental killing of a steer a day or two previous had something to do with the business.

A REMARKABLE accident occurred on the Grand Trunk Railway, some twelve miles from Fort Erie, on Wednesday evening last. A special freight train struck a cow. The engine passed over the cow without leaving the rails, but the following four freight cars left the rails, broke loose from the engine, shot across a ditch and into a field. The balance of the train, about eighteen freight cars and a caboose, passed on as if nothing happened, were coupled to the engine and proceeded to Port Colborne. The track was not broken.

CAPTAIN A. HUDSON, well known in Salvation Army circles in this city and Summerside, has resigned his position owing to ill-health. He has, it is said, decided to study for the ministry.

THE Pietou News reports that Mr. Donald Murray, West Branch, River John, raises his own smoking tobacco and it is not a bad article at all.
