LONDON'S 'DRIFT' CHILDREN AND SOME EFFORTS TO SAVE THEM BY "OUR AMERICAN COUSIN." (Golden Rule). A few months ago, in England, we met a bright, energetic, wiry American, Mr. C. L. Boyer, who is known as "our American cousin," and who is doing an immense amount of good for the boys and girls in the East End of London.

"Hollo, Charlie, where might you be going? Now, don't be afraid; I am to the School Board office!" The speaker was a short, wiry man, with a Yankee cut beard, and with that "beaming" expression which at once attracts the child and wins the confidence of the youth.

"What is your name?" "Willie Johnson." The name is at once registered in a small memorandum book. "And where do you live, Willie?" "Number 54 L—street." The address is written against the boy's name.

"Is your father living?" "Yes." "And your mother?" "Yes." These particulars are also entered. "Have you any brothers and sisters?" "Yes, Johnny and Tommy and Sally and Margie."

These names, with the respective ages, are all registered, together with the names of the other children—lodging in Willie Johnson's house. Meantime, half a dozen other boys have gathered around the lad and his friend, and the same particulars are elicited from each, and duly entered.

It so happens that the gay procession has to pass the house where their stranger-friend lives. He cries "Halt!" when all stand still, and in a minute or two their leader reappears with some glaring banners, bearing mottoes, such as:—"JESUS LOVES THE CHILDREN!" "WE WANT BREAD NOT BEER."

The march is resumed; the park is reached—and what a boon is Victoria Park to East-enders!—the captains are made responsible for the banners, an honor which is much appreciated by the poor lads, for they were never intrusted with such fine things before.

Their friend then takes a whistle from his pocket, and with it makes a sound,—well, it is a mystery to me where that whistle could have come from; I cannot describe the noise which it is capable of producing, but it is a shrill, discordant sound, which seems to charm the young folk, and like a magnet draws them into a group around the leader. He says:—"Boys and girls, I guess some of you are hungry. I have some biscuits in this bag, and after you have sung a chorus, which I will teach, I will pass the biscuits round."

The lines are committed to memory, and admirably sung. Why, the poor little dears never had an opportunity of displaying their vocal powers to such advantage! The biscuits and the sweets are handed round, and thoroughly enjoyed by the tattered children, to whom such things are real luxuries.

From the commencement of the "Drift Children's Mission" work it has not been Mr. Boyer's wish to erect new halls, but to gather the "drift" or neglected children, into the mission halls and schools already in existence. Mr. Boyer is now known to more than 20,000 children in the east end of London; he has paid over 40,000 visits upon these boys and girls at their homes, in many cases reaching the parents, who never attend a place of worship, and inviting them to a Gospel service. There have been upwards of 295 special meetings for the children, with a total attendance of over 68,000.

A noble work this. May this "American Cousin" come back with his native health some day and start a similar movement among the slums of our own great cities. Pointer for Advertisers.
