End Of Viet Nam Bombing Seen As Only Peace Hope

MOSCOW (CP) — External Affairs Minister Martin's talks with Soviet leaders last week are reported to have left the Canadian official convinced that cessation of American bombings of North Viet Nam offers the only chance of an eventual negotiated end to the Viet Nam war.

It is believed that Canada now may be ready to urge Washington to stop the bombings, in the hope that this will lead to a conciliatory response from the Communist side.

Martin detected no softening of the Soviet position in the exhaustive round of talks he had here with Communist Party boss Leonid Brezhnev, Premier Kosygin, president Podgorny, Foreign Minister Gromyko and First Deputy Premier Fobyansky.

They told him, as the Kremlin has been stating for nearly two years, that American air raids must be halted unconditionally. There could be no concessions on this point.

When Martin demanded to know what the Russians were prepared to do by way of a peace initiative if bombing did stop, the Kremlin leaders were totally non-committal.

STILL HAD HOPES
Nevertheless, Martin personally got the impression that the Russians, once bombs have stopped falling, might try to persuade North Viet Nam to make a reciprocal gesture.

It is the hope of various prospective peace-makers around the world that, with proper handling, Hanoi might be induced to stop its infiltration of troops into South Viet Nam and enter into peace negotiations.
