## Local Hockey Given Until September 1 To Pay \$500

MONCTON (CP)—The Charlotte-town Islanders hockey club was given until Sept. 1 to pay \$500 owed the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League, when the league met here Sunday.

The loop will recommend the suspension of the Charlotte-town Forum and club director Forrest E. C. Clow from organized hockey until the claim has been satisfied. League officials said after the meeting.

A Charlotte-town appeal on behalf of the hockey club and players Danny O'Connor and Bob Gray, against fines assessed by the league following a near-riot in the Moncton Stadium March 5, was turned down.

### GUARANTEED PAYMENT

Charlotte-town was fined \$100, O'Connor \$25 and Gray \$25. The fines were guaranteed by the Islanders club and the league wants them paid.

Further discussion regarding the Charlotte-town club arose when Moncton Hawks made a demand that Charlotte-town pay them money the Hawks say is owed

from the fifth game of the league finals, played in Charlotte-town.

A communication received from J. T. Carvell, Moncton lawyer said a league ruling stipulates the amusement tax should be deducted from the gate; also a stipulated amount for the rink, plus an amount for expenses for the visiting team. The balance was to be split evenly between the two clubs.

### ASKS LEAGUE'S AID

Mr. Carvell said this had not been done, and asked the league's assistance in collecting the money claimed by the Hawks. The amount was not disclosed.

The financial statement given the league by auditors showed the league operated during the 1954-55 season with a surplus.

Amherst entered an appeal for payment from Fredericton for a forfeited game, and the appeal was set over to the annual meeting Sept. 11, with the consent of both clubs.

A demand by imported and local playoffs will be reported to the MAHA and CAHA respectively.

# White Sox Move To Within One Game Of Indians; Dodgers Split With Cincinnati

A sparkling three-hitter by pitcher Dick Donovan and a ninth-inning double by George Kell enabled Chicago White Sox to down Washington Senators 3-0 and 5-4 Sunday. The doubleheader victory for the White Sox moved them to within a game of Cleveland Indians, American League leaders, who split with the last-place Baltimore Orioles.

Big Mike Garcia of the Indians blanked Baltimore 5-0 after the Orioles had taken New York Yankees and Kansas City split another American League twin bill, the As winning the opener 4-3 behind Bobby Shantz' six-hit pitching and the Yankees capturing the nightcap 8-4. Detroit Tigers and Boston Red Sox also divided a pair. Boston won the opener 10-4 and Detroit the afterpiece, 9-3.

Cincinnati Reds threw a roadblock at the rampaging Brooklyn Dodgers, turning back the National League leaders 11-4 after the Brooks won the first game of a doubleheader 7-1.

Chicago Cubs and New York Giants came out even in a twin bill, the Cubs winning the opener 5-2 and the Giants taking the nightcap 9-4 after rallying for six runs in the fifth inning.

Chicago Cubs' 25-year-old right-hander, pitched a three-hitter for St. Louis Cardinals as they defeated Pittsburgh Pirates 5-1.

Robin Roberts held Milwaukee to seven hits as Philadelphia snapped a 13-game losing streak by drubbing the Braves 9-1 in the nightcap of a doubleheader. Milwaukee nipped the Phils 6-5 in the opener, aided by two consecutive homers by Ed Matthews.

The Braves had to rally for two runs in the eighth to win the opener. Del Crandall's single provided the deciding tally. The Phils got 13 hits off Milwaukee hurlers but left 15 runners on base. Dave Jolly was the winner.

A six-run spurt in the third inning fired Philadelphia to victory in the second game. Starter Chet Nichols, who gave up four of these runs, was the loser.

Donovan's shutout in the first game at Washington was his third.

## Cockell Not Expected To Last Five Rounds Tonight

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Rocky Marciano is expected to demolish Don Cockell, a broad-beamed British hog farmer, in the fifth defence of his world heavyweight title Monday night at Kezar Stadium.

The sturdy champ from Brockton, Mass., unbeaten in a 47-fight career which includes 41 knockouts, is such a top-heavy favorite that there is practically no betting on the result. One source lists Marciano as a 9-to-1 choice. It's about 8 to 5 that Cockell won't last five rounds.

Cockell, first British heavyweight to get a chance at the crown since Tommy Farr fought Joe Louis in 1937, has failed to impress in his training at suburban San Rafael. Although the 26-year-old challenger has trimmed down from 220 pounds to 208, he

has glaring defensive weaknesses and does not appear to have the punch to bother Rocky. **MUST WATCH CUTS**
