

Schools Face A Dilemma; "Whom" Is Being Liquidated

EDMONTON (CP) — A leading Alberta education official says the word "whom" may be on the way out of the spoken English language.

Dr. W. H. Swift, deputy minister of education, told the Canadian Club here that while he prefers to continue using "whom" in its proper grammatical place, the word is gradually losing its place in the spoken language.

Use of "to who," "for who," and "with who" just doesn't sound right, Dr. Swift said, but this might be only because most English-speaking people had been brought up on the correct grammatical usage.

LOSING BATTLE

Dr. Swift summarized the position in this way:

1. "Who" has extensively replaced "whom" in common speech.
2. Since "whom" has no intrinsic superiority over "who," it is hardly worth the effort for schools and other groups to continue to wage a losing battle trying to maintain the traditional distinction in all sentence forms.
3. Use of "whom" in the proper sense offers difficulty for many persons and is the cause of uncertainty, perhaps embarrassment which could be avoided if "who" were accepted generally.
4. "Perhaps we should recognize 'who' as being equally acceptable for both subjective and objective forms, with an optional form 'whom' which may be used by those who prefer it in objective situations, especially following pronouns."

The schools face a dilemma, he said, as more and more educated persons begin using "who" in situations where the rules of grammar call for "whom."

"As for me," he concluded, "until somehow 'whom' is fully liquidated, I shall doubtless be with those who carry forward the vestigial remains."

"I suspect that I shall, in fact, old friend 'whom,' be fully liquidated long before my time."

Camille Henry Hopes He Is In Major Leagues To Stay

NEW YORK (AP) — A scrawny-looking Canadian youngster who has made the grade as a prospect for Milwaukee Braves is giving New York Rangers a lift in their battle to win a National Hockey League playoff position.

"I'm sure glad," chose hockey "baseball," says centre Camille Henry. "I think I'm up in this league to stay now."

In his last three games, the 22-year-old native of Quebec City has scored eight points, including three goals. He had a vital goal and assisted on another Sunday night as the Rangers beat Montreal Canadiens 3-4 to take over sole possession of fourth place — the final Stanley Cup playoff berth.

"I guess if I had been an American instead of a Canadian I would have accepted the Braves' offer. They told me I had a good chance of making the big leagues," he explained.

TOO SMALL?

Henry is five feet, 10 inches tall and weighs 150 pounds. He appears shorter and looks to weigh about 130. He was voted the NHL's rookie-of-the-year in 1954 but even then, he says, his slight build held him back.

"I guess some of the coaches thought I was too small for hockey. Naturally, even now I try to avoid too much body contact, but when it comes to getting the

Pancho Segura Trims Sedgman

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Pancho Segura of Ecuador won his biggest professional tennis tournament yet with a 7-5, 6-0, 6-4 victory over Frank Sedgman that astonished 10,000 Australians at the White City Stadium Sunday.

"I won this tournament," the little South American said, "because I was the best tennis player in it."

To win Australia's biggest professional tournament, the 35-year-old Segura first toppled Rex Hartwig of Australia, then Pancho Gonzales of the United States to get to Sedgman in the final.

In both earlier matches he was in sets down, then won three in a straight.

"I trained hard to take out first prize of \$2,000 (Australian) which is \$4,500 to me," said Segura. "I needed the money."

Arnie Sowell Zips To World Indoor Record

NEW YORK (AP) — Arnie Sowell of Pitt zipped to a world indoor half-mile record of 1:50.3. Mill Campbell stepped the magic seven-second 60-yard high hurdles for the first time and Ron Delany galloped to a 4:06.7 mile victory over Hungary's Lazo Tabori in the Millrose Games Saturday night before more than 15,000 fans in Madison Square Garden.

The crowd was in a record mood after watching Sowell and Campbell set new standards and were hoping that someone might push Delany to a record.

But the Olympic 1,500-metre champion merely loped along in the pack until it was time to step to the fore. About a lap and a half from home he passed Tabori, then was content to permit the dejected Hungarian, who has yet to win an indoor race in four starts, try to catch him. Delany was perhaps seven yards in front at the end.

Tabori's time was 4:07.6.

Sowell beat the old half-mile indoor record of 1:50.5, set by John Borican in 1942.

Big Campbell electrified the crowd with his seven-second hurdles.

Like the 16-foot pole vault, the seven-foot high jump and the six-second 60-yard dash, the seven-second 60-yard hurdles until now has eluded the best timber toppers in the world—and that included the inimitable Harrison Dillard, who held the former record of 7.1.

Just to make it emphatic, Mill did it twice. He appeared to be letting up as he hit the finish in a semifinal. But two of the three watches caught him in seven flat. The other registered 7.1.

Then in the final, he whipped to the front and nipped Lee Calhoun of North Carolina College by inches.

John Landy Will Continue To Run

MELBOURNE (AP) — World mile record holder John Landy said Thursday night he is "finished" with international athletics but will continue to compete because he likes to be "one of the boys."

Landy, who set a world mile record of 3:58 in 1954, has been hampered by leg troubles since he started training for the 1956 Olympic Games.

"I don't wish to announce my retirement because that would be the finish—once you say you have retired, you have had it," Landy said.

"I want to keep on running, but it won't last very much longer."
