## SHUT UP IN SANTIAGO

### By The American Fleets

CERVERA IS NOW BLOCKADED BY THE YANKEES.

But is Well Defended, Mobilization at the Philippines.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, May 26.—The Madrid correspondent of the Daily Mail says: "Official telegrams from Cuba confirm the report that rear Admirals Sampson and Schley, with their combined squadrons are now in front of Santiago de Cuba, blockading Admiral Cervera. Ministers consider that Santiago possesses sufficient defences to meet any aggressive action the enemy may take. Great importance is attached to the latest news from the Philippines respecting the Spanish plan of mobilization.

### A CONTRADICTION RUMOR.

Regarding Whereabouts of Cervera's Fleet.

## TROOPS FOR THE PHILIPPINES

### Three Transports Sailed

WITH 2,500 MEN ON BOARD FOR MANILA

And Stores and Ammunition for Dewey's Fleet.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 26.—A start was made late yesterday and the first American army to leave for a foreign shore is now on the Pacific.

Three transports left, and they carried about 2,500 men.

The expedition is under the command of Brigadier General Anderson.

The fleet is loaded with supplies to last a year, and carries a big cargo of ammunition and naval stores for Admiral Dewey's fleet.

### WARSHIPS FOR UNCLE SAM.

Bill Asking for Construction of forty-five Ships.

WASHINGTON, May 26.—Yesterday, a bill was introduced into Congress asking for the authorization of an order for the construction of no less than forty-five new warships including a number of cruisers.

### A FATAL COLLISION

Between two British India Steamships.

CALCUTTA, May 26.—On Tuesday while the British India Steam Navigation Company's steamer Mecca was towing her sister ship Unhunda the hawser parted and the two vessels came into collision. The Mecca sank and the captain and 52 others were drowned.

### VESSELS IN RESERVE.

Coal Stored at Cadiz.

GIBRALTAR, May 25.—It is the present purpose of the Spanish Government to send the Carlos V., and two destroyers to Cuba, provided that Admiral Cervera can get into Havana, which is his purpose. The Pelayo and the Alphonso XIII., one destroyer and the Giralda, will remain in Cadiz, for the present, and the Government will dispose of them as events indicate.

The troop-ship Patriota Saturnestegui, with a thousand soldiers on board, left Barcelona on April 23, for the Philippines but was ordered back from Aden, and is now at Suez.

There are 40,000 tons of coal at Cadiz and 30,000 tons more are expected this week. One firm has contracted for 150,000 tons for Cadiz.

## PREPARED FOR A MOVE.

### Now Ready to Invade

CUBA AND PORTO RICO WILL BE ATTACKED.

The Delay is at an End.—Troops Will Move at Once.

WASHINGTON, May 26.—The President's call for volunteers will be followed by the immediate invasion of Porto Rico and Cuba.

An expedition of 60,000 will be sent at once to seize and occupy San Juan and Porto Rico.

Rear Admiral Sampson has been ordered to take his fleet to San Juan and prepare the way for the arrival of the troops.

He is to destroy the fortifications so that the army can land. The invasion of Cuba will likewise be started immediately and 100,000 men will be the strength of the invading army.

The report of a disagreement between the Army and Navy regarding the invasion of Cuba is not confirmed.

General Miles only insisted on the forward "move" being delayed, until all preparations were complete.

### GLADSTONE LYING IN STATE.

LONDON, May 26.—Gladstone's remains arrived at Westminster, London, at one o'clock this morning. The coffin has been placed in position for laying in state. This was done about three o'clock this morning when Canon Wilberforce conducted a special service in the presence of Henry and Herbert Gladstone.

## THE PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

### The Plebiscite Question.

THE BILL READ A THIRD TIME AND DISCUSSED.

Statement by Sir Wilfrid Laurier—Business Nearly all Done.

Ottawa, May 25.—In the House of Commons, yesterday, Sir Wilfrid Laurier announced that the Government had no business of importance to bring forward this session.

He did not move for morning sessions, yet but that will probably be moved today.

The Plebiscite bill was read a third time and the Premier was asked for information on the subject by members, but Sir Wilfrid Laurier said the questions were unreasonable.

The temperance organizations, he said, were perfectly satisfied with the bill as it stood and did not ask a more specific declaration.

If the people voted against prohibitions, then the matter would end.

If they voted for prohibitions, then it would be the duty of the government to discuss whether the time had arrived to introduce a prohibitory law. Suffrages unto the day was the end thereof?

### SPY CAPTURED AT KEY WEST.
