CHARGED WITH LIBEL.—The Rev. Dr. Forbes, a prominent Methodist clergyman of Minneapolis, Minn., is to be prosecuted for criminal libel in open conference. He charged a member of his congregation with ruining his home.

BILLIARDS.—Frank Ives has been matched to play John Roberts, the English billiard champion, in London next January, for £500 a side, of which £250 has already been deposited as a forfeit. The game will be 12,000 points up, and will run through six days, 1000 points being played each afternoon and evening.

THE policy of the future will probably be pretty well discussed in Charlottetown within the next month. Mr. Erastus Wiman will give us his view next week, and arrangements are being made for a lecture by the Rev. Dr. Wilson, of New Brunswick, President of the Imperial Federation League.

POLICE COURT.—This morning Mary Ann Murphy, "the Irish lady of distinction," was given six months imprisonment with hard labor; and a man who neglected to pay his dog tax was fined \$1 and costs. Daniel O'Connell, charged with the larceny of \$45 from Chas. a Plager on the 12th inst., was remanded to jail until to-morrow.

A SMASH-UP.—Persons coming to the city this morning noticed a single sea ed wagon lying on its side in the ditch at the junction of the North River and Lower Millip que Road. The rims and spokes of the two front wheels were gone and the shafts broken. By the appearance of the shattered spokes it is evident the runaway came along the North River Road towards the city. The occupants are not known.

A COLLECTION.—We are requested to state that the item in yesterday's Patriot "that Inspic or Hackett had been exonerated at the investigation held at the office of the Department of Marine and Fisheries," is premature, as the Commission has not expressed his opinion, nor will he until the whole evidence has been laid before the Honorable the Minister of Marine and Fisheries. The examination did not close until 10 o'clock last night.

SHIPPING DISASTERS.—Of the six fishermen reported missing from the Gloucester schooner Henrietta, three were landed at Bay of Bulls, N.B., by the schooner Knight Templar, and the other three are reported to have been picked up by a Newfoundland schooner.

The Newfoundland schooner Reason has been missing since August 15th, and is given up for lost, with a crew of ten men. The captain is reported to have said before sailing that the vessel was unseaworthy and not fit to go on the banks. She was fully insured.

ARROSTOCK'S POTATOES.—A produce dealer who has been in Arrostock county buying potatoes says the potato crop is unusually good there, and much excitement prevails. Mr. Thos. Phair, of Presque Isle, the potato king of the county, will add largely to his already snug pile. He contracted for the yield of 1,000 acres at last year's prices and gets the benefit of the big boom now on. He runs six starch factories. Individual buyers are paying the farmers \$2,000 and \$3,000 a day for potatoes. One farmer who offered his farm and buildings for \$1,600 last winter has already sold \$2,300 worth of potatoes raised this season.—St. John Telegraph.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

A DESPERATE ATTEMPT

To Wreck a Train at Moncton

MONCTON, Oct. 14. A desperate attempt was made last night to wreck the early morning train to St. John. A railway tie and a large deal were placed across the track just above the station, but fortunately no serious damage was done. As the train passed the station several shots were fired at the cars, one shot entering the station building and lodging in the wall just above the telegraph operator's head. Henry Campbell, who was some years ago in the lunatic asylum, was arrested on suspicion and brought to Moncton.

An Embezzler Arrested.

BOSTON, Oct. 14. John F. Steadman, of St. John, was arrested here yesterday. He was manager of the Intercolonial Railway Cattle Yard at St. John, and is charged with the embezzlement of \$370. He was brought before the United States District Court on the question of extradition. The hearing was postponed to Oct. 28. Bail fixed at \$1000.

Changes on the G. T. R.

TORONTO, Oct. 14. Quite a surprise was created here by a despatch from Montreal, stating that Supt. Still, of the great western division of the Grand Trunk Railway, had been replaced by Jas. Stephenson, late General-Superintendent of the Grand Trunk proper. Other important changes are expected.

The South Australian Government.

ADELAIDE, South Australia, Oct. 14. The ministry of this colony has resigned in consequence of the government's defeat on its financial proposals in the House of Assembly.

The Columbian Celebration.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14. The Columbian celebration was brought to a close last night by a grand banquet.

TORONTO, Oct. 14.—10 a. m. Winds mostly westerly with some local showers; stationary or higher temperature.

General Telegraphic News.

LONDON, Oct. 12.—The Times' correspondent at Rome asserts that he once, in conversation with a conservative chief expressed surprise at the presence of a certain minister in Marquis Rudini's cabinet, and that the chief replied that Marquis Rudini was compelled to include in the cabinet the man referred to, because he was ahead of the Camorra of Naples and controlled all of the disorderly elements in the southern provinces.

QUEBEC, Oct. 12.—In the celebration of the four hundredth anniversary of the discovery of America, Cardinal Lacombe, officiated at Pontifical Mass. The city church bells chimed out at noon and a hundred guns were fired from the citadel.

MONTREAL, Oct. 12.—The Star has the following special cable this evening from London: "In accordance with Montreal advice British and Scandinavian immigration will be resumed at Liverpool to-morrow. The Dominion line is looking through to United States points."

The British board of trade returns show that exports to Canada increased one per cent. in the nine months ended September, and the imports from Canada increased sixteen per cent. Butter increased \$125,000, cheese, \$145,000, wood nearly five million dollars.

MONTREAL, Oct. 12.—A movement is on foot among Canadian sugar refiners to introduce the New York trust system in Canada.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Oct. 12.—Clifford Calverly, aged 22, galvanizing iron worker, of Clarksburg, Ont., but more recently of Toronto, crossed Niagara River to-day on three inch wire cable, which was 900 feet long. His time in crossing was only six minutes, eight seconds, best previous time being the late Photographer Dixon's, which was 12 minutes, 30 seconds. Calverly fearfully ran over the wire, with the exception of the middle portion which, owing to oscillation, had to be traversed more cautiously. The wire was 250 feet above the terrible rapids. Afterwards, at each end of the wire, he performed marvellous and daring tricks; sitting, lying, dancing and running backwards on the wire and hanging to it with his toes. His daring and skill exceed those of all his predecessors and stamp him as the greatest tight rope performer in the work. He never walked a rope till four months ago.

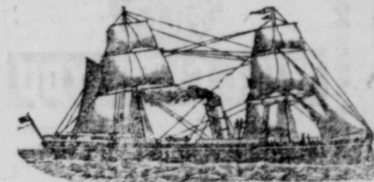
