

# Victims Of Rink Collapse Buried In Mass Funeral

LISTOWEL, Ont. (CP) — Listowel paid its last respects to the victims of Saturday's hockey rink tragedy.

Schools and businesses were closed. This western Ontario town of 2,500 was deep in mourning for the seven boys, all under 13, and the community's recreation director, Kenneth McLeod.

The eight were killed when the roof of Listowel's arena, built four years ago as a memorial to others who had died, collapsed during a hockey game.

All normal activity came to a standstill as most of the townsfolk and many from other communities attended a mass funeral in mid-afternoon.

More than 1,500 persons, neighbors, friends, fellow hockey players, brothers and sisters, mothers and fathers, climbed slowly up

the hill to the two churches. Inside the United Church the coffins lay beneath a huge bank of flowers.

A block away 600 people in Knox Presbyterian Church listened to the service relayed from the United Church. Another 100 stood in the slushy street, clustered around loudspeakers.

Rev. J. D. Martin, minister of the United Church, said to the mourning relatives:

"Our community has been struck a severe blow. Nothing quite so sudden and dramatic has occurred before, with its loss of precious lives and severe injuries to others. We have experienced a mighty wave of sympathy, concern and desire to be of help. This wave of concern is a sure token of victory of the triumph of the spirit of man, girded by
