Lunenburg Girl Wins N. S. Ladies Golf Ch'ship

SYDNEY (CP)—The Nova Scotia ladies' open golf title came back to Nova Scotia at rain-soaked Langan Country club Tuesday when 16-year-old Rita Lohmes of Lunenburg defeated defending champion Mary Ellen Driscoll by one stroke for the 36 holes.

At the end of the 18 holes Tuesday, Rita had a 95 against 96 for Mary Ellen who shoots out of the Saint John Riverside course. The previous day they had matched 86's on the par 79, 720-yard course.

It was almost a five-hour battle amid drenching rains that left the greens covered with puddles. Mary Ellen was outdriven by the slight south shore lass but it was the steady play of Rita which told the tale. She was four up, 44-48, for the first nine, lost three strokes early, but managed to stay out front. Coming into the last hole she had a single stroke. They matched par fives on the last.

Mrs. H. P. Connor, former Nova Scotia and Maritime champion, finished third with 192, a single stroke ahead of Mrs. Graham Dey of Truro.

Mrs. Tommy Lagan of Halifax Ashburn had a single stroke edge over Mrs. R.M. Bolton, another Ashburn player, for fifth.

Rita Lohmes, Mrs. Conner, Mrs. Dey and Mrs. Bolton will comprise the Nova Scotia team in the Canadian ladies golf championship at Victoria later this month.

Doane Wins N.S. Jr. Golf Title

AMHERST (CP)—Alan Doane of Halifax Ashburn club carded a 251 in 54 holes here Monday and Tuesday to win the Nova Scotia junior golf championship by two strokes.

This is the husky 18-year-old's last year as a junior. He qualifies for the Canadian amateur junior championships in Calgary next month.

His nearest rival was New Glasgow's Doug Hood, Jr., who finished with a 253 for the two days of play on the par 72 course.

Peter Tregunnon of Ashburn had 255 and D. Muttart of Kentville placed with 259.

Charlie Conroy of the Kentville club, who led after the first 18 holes, dropped out when he shot a 90 in the second round.

A total of 27 young golfers took part. D. Thompson of New Glasgow carded a 276 gross and R. Mingo of Truro 311.

Campanella's Operation Leads To Court Case

NEW YORK (AP)—Counsel for a surgeon who operated on the left hand of Roy Campanella, Brooklyn Dodgers' catcher, accused Walter O'Malley, president of the Brooklyn club, of making slanderous statements against the doctor in papers filed Tuesday in Supreme Court.

The charges were made by counsel, Dr. Samuel Shenkman, Manhattan neuro-surgeon, who is suing Campanella for \$9,500 for medical services. They were contained in an affidavit accompanying a motion to restrict Campanella's demand for a bill of particulars.

In the affidavit, the lawyer, Benjamin Shenkman, charged O'Malley made a remark that the surgeon "thought he was operating on Roy's bankroll."

"The plaintiff," the affidavit said, "does not intend to permit these remarks to go uncontested. However, that is something for another forum."

The affidavit said in May, 1954, Campanella suffered an injury to his left hand.

The papers state that Dr. Shenkman operated on the catcher last October, and that Campanella's batting average "at the present time" is .355, compared with .207 last year.

Record Run In Speedboat

LAKE ULLSWATER, England (AP)—Donald Campbell of Britain made an unofficial run Tuesday night with his turbo-jet speedboat Bluebird in speed faster than the world water record.

He drove the Bluebird at 185 miles an hour but it was not in a record attempt. He said afterward that slight modifications might be made before he makes an official try at the world mark.

"I have to return to London for consultations before any date can be given for the record try," he said.

The 34-year-old son of the late Sir Malcolm Campbell said the boat's power is "simply terrific."

His return run was in the 160 miles an hour class.

Toronto Argonauts Begin Football Season Training

TORONTO (CP)—Toronto Argonauts, aiming for nothing less than the Grey Cup after an off-season shake-up that was the main topic of football fans here and across the country, Monday night began their training grind for the 1955 Big Four season.

More than 40 players signed to Argo contracts and nearly 20 others from junior and intermediate ranks sponsored by Argos turned out for the first practice after the league earlier in the day headed off what looked to be another controversy started by the Toronto club.

The league, in a hastily-conducted telephone poll, agreed that pre-season training could start Monday. The Argos had indicated they intended to start Monday night—four days before the July 15 date agreed upon earlier by the league—despite objections of the other clubs, particularly Hamilton Tiger-Cats and Montreal Alouettes.

The Argos will hold their workouts on the University of Toronto back campus for nearly three weeks and then shift operations to Trinity College school, Port Hope, Ont., 67 miles west of here. They will train there from July 29 to Aug. 7 before leaving for a three-day game exhibition tour of the west. The Argos, who finished in third place in 1954, have been revamped from top to bottom. Swimmers To Be Guinea Pigs

LONDON (AP)—Twenty long distance swimmers from 16 countries will act as "guinea pig" during the mass English channel race Aug. 11.

A group of doctors, led by Ever-est clumbers Dr. O. G. Edholm and Dr. Griffiths Pugh will study the reactions of the swimmers during the race.

They will travel in a navy launch and keep in constant touch with the swimmers.

The swim is organized by Billy Butlin, British holiday camp boss. First prize is a gold cup valued at \$2,940. The first man and first woman across will win \$1,400 each.

About 50 boats, including the pilot vessels, will leave Folkestone, England, the evening of Aug. 10 for Cape Gris Nez. The swimmers—first women and 15 men—will plunge into the water for the race back to England about midnight.

SHERBROOKE, Que. (CP)—Lorenze Lamontagne, 24, pulled from the water Sunday two miles short of a planned 34-mile swim of Lake Memphremagog, says he plans to take a crack at the English channel next year.

He made the statement Monday night at a reception tendered him by the city of Sherbrooke.
