Omaha Loses Close Race

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEWMARKET, England, July 2.—Carrying top weight of 138 pounds, William Woodward's Omaha lost his last bid for a major victory on the English turf today when he dropped a narrow decision to the Aga Khan's Taj Akbar in the Princess of Wales stakes. The American-bred son of Gallant Fox, 8 to 11 choice to whip five high class rivals, finished the 1 1/2 miles a neck back of Taj Akbar, the winner, runner up to his stablemate, Mahmoud in the Derby, stepped the distance in two minutes, 35 seconds over a heavy course. Taj Akbar, second choice at 4 to 1, received 18 pounds from Omaha, which earlier lost the Ascot Gold Cup by the narrow margin of a nose. James A. de Rothschild's Esquemeling was third, five lengths back. The defeat was Omaha's second setback in four starts in England.
