

Dreyfus' Sufferings.

PARIS, July 8.—Maitre Labori says: "Dreyfus' mind has now quite recovered its equilibrium. In fact I saw him laugh yesterday. It was the first time he had laughed in nearly five years. I was telling him of Du Puy de Cham's interviews with Esterhazy in the cemetery, when they disguised themselves with false beards and goggles. Dreyfus suddenly burst out laughing. "Why of all the penny dreadfuls!" he exclaimed.

Dreyfus has told us of the devilish tortures to which he was subjected. His guards were the roughest, most heartless of ruffians. They imagined they would gain favour with the authorities by treating the prisoner with violence and meanness.

One day, when Dreyfus was in a high fever, he accidentally upset a jug of water near his bed. His punishment was that no water was given him to drink for twenty-four hours. By noon next day he was almost raving mad with thirst.

When a letter was sent pretending to warn M. Lebon, Minister of the Colonies, that Dreyfus would attempt to escape, although the letter was proved a forgery, Lebon ordered Dreyfus to be put in irons. Notwithstanding that he was very ill he was strapped and confined to his bed. Thus he was left twenty days without medical attendance.

But this outrage, Dreyfus says, saved him. He was so sick at heart, so ill of body, he was willing to die. But when he realized that there was a plot to kill him, he gathered all his energy to resist and he lived.

The story about the cage is not true, but the torturer, Lebon, devised for Dreyfus a pallid-like inclosure that was little better than a cage.

Another idiotic measure was to keep a lamp burning over Dreyfus's bed all night long. The pretext was that his every movement must be watched. The light attracted swarms of fearful tropical insects that eat men alive. They turned sleep into a nightmare. Dreyfus dreaded the night more than the broiling sun and more than those human hyenas who stole Dreyfus's food and fed him for weeks on the most revolting messes telling him that his family had ceased to send money to him.

For months Lebon suppressed letters to him. Then, again, his guards were instructed to pester and harass Dreyfus into making a confession.

"See even your family has abandoned you," they constantly said to him. "Better own up and confess."

The fact is that Dreyfus became the plaything of his coarse idle gaolers.

Gas Notes.

We notice by the Progressive Age that the Washington Machine Company has recently built some very large gas engines to be used for running electric plant. Last year a 650 h.p. gas engine was completed and they have now a contract for the Columbia Power Co. for one of 650 h.p. and one of 280 h.p. Also a 200 h.p. for the Bradford P. Electric Co. The Progressive Age gives photographs of these engines and also states that the patterns are now being made for a 1500 h.p. gas engine.

The lighting reform for New Haven, Conn., is now published. It shows that besides the existing electric lights that one hundred more street lamps have been installed. They now have 205 aer lamps, 178 gas-common burner-lamps and 460 arc lamps. Streets with shade trees are to be lighted by the aer lights to a greater extent. During the recent great storm the aer and gas lamps remained burning while broken wires cut off the electric light.

Irish Agriculture.

LONDON, July 8.—In Parliament it is a rare sight to see Irish members accepting gifts from a Conservative Government almost without reserve, as they have Gerald Balfour's bill, which proposes to spend nearly a million dollars on a new department for agricultural technical instruction. Nearly half of this sum is to come out of the Imperial exchequer. The bill was welcomed so heartily in Ireland that the Irish members could not oppose it in Parliament although John Dillon, while accepting the principal features, objected to details. Others, like Redmond, were more grateful.

Imperial Injunction.

YOKOHAMA, July 8.—In view of the coming into operation of the treaty between Japan and certain foreign powers, the Emperor has issued a receipt enjoining the people to observe courtesy and tact in their intercourse with foreigners.

It is announced that the Imperial government will carry out the original agreement by bearing with Canada ten-eighths of the cost of the work. Thus the cable will be all British and the monopoly of the Eastern Company will be broken.

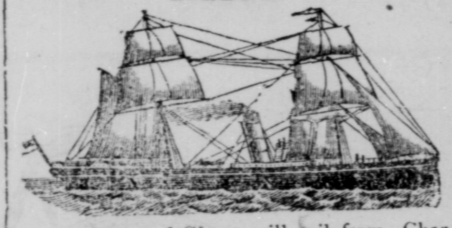
