Thoughts For Our Time

Fan-mail, autograph-seekers, multiple movie and sports magazines and crowded arenas amply testify that hero-worship is not unknown in our day. They obviously testify, too, that this present age is not without its heroes. And if we differ in this respect from peoples of the past or of other continents or from others in our midst, the difference lies not in having heroes but in having the heroes that we have.

It is characteristic of men to be moved to admiration by the greatness he sees in others and also to aspire to that greatness. Every age in history has had its heroes and the influence which such heroes have exercised in evoking the better qualities in others is, perhaps, incalculable.

But this influence can also work against man, especially by calling forth and arousing in him not the better qualities but those varied inhuman and bestial responses of which man is also capable.

Intimately tied in with the entire notion of what constitutes human greatness together with one's general outlook on human life and on man's place in the universe. Hence, insofar as heroes embody the ideals and the aspirations of a people, they at the same time reveal a people's whole philosophy of life.

It is easy to see then that according as one's ideals differ, so will one's heroes differ. The same evidently applies to a people as a whole or to a period of history. The heroes of one historical age will differ from those of another historical age according as the general outlook on life will differ. Thus, we find in the course of history such extreme types of heroism as that exemplified in the humility and meekness of St. John the Baptist and that exemplified in the pride and brutality of the Nazi.

Literature And Life

 DISAGREEABLE PEOPLE

It is true that there are such people as are mentioned at the head of this article. I suppose we have all met some of them at one time or another. There are those who know so much. You can never tell them anything. They seem to anticipate you as though what you were to say was worth nothing. As though they said, "Oh any one knows that."

Then there are those who will not agree with you on any consideration. To use a common phrase, "will not play ball". This seems at the moment to be the spirit incarnated in the Soviet people. We had a minister once in the Maritime provinces who used a figure of speech which I still remember — He said "some people are like a man who locked a door and threw away a key"; for some people shut their minds up with the key of prejudice and throw away the key, and would listen to reason no more. Did not Paul pray to be delivered from unreasonable and wicked men?

It is not disagreeable to have to listen to a stream of talk with nothing in it? Bishop Butler said once that there was talk that if you take away the physical element in it you have nothing left. It was physical exercise and that alone! The tongue wagged, there was sound, signifying nothing; or again, it may be a poor listener, one who hears nothing that you say. People who are always talking about their possessions are not very agreeable. There is what the New Testament calls the "pride of life", meaning what we call showing off, bragging about mere "things".

Again there are those who are always borrowing from others and sometimes forget their obligation. Books are borrowed and never returned.

Has not Alexander Pope a line to the effect that "at every word a reputation dies"? We do not like to hear one person running down another, for the thought comes to us that that person may treat us the same way when he is talking to another.

However, here are others of another stamp. Two incidents I recall at this moment which tend to redeem the situation somewhat. Years ago I was driving in the country where the road was narrow and passing was not easy, especially when I was not a particularly good driver. The man who gave us the half of the road smiled and passed on. He was not well dressed, he said nothing but my wife said: "I'll warrant that he is a kind man at home." That was her reaction. I did not know his name; we met that once — I still see the exact place. I still see the smile and this after more than half a lifetime!

The other is a cadence of the voice and the way a man — and a hard-working carriage maker pronounced one little word; the word was "lovely". He applied the word to the weather. I have never heard man or woman put the same music into that little word as did he and

I used to like to greet him just to hear him say "lovely". I still hear it after many years. He was a pleasant man to meet and talk to. He had no twist in him as so many of us have.

So there are some of the other kind. The man who will listen to your speech even if it is not of the best and you know it surer than anyone; the man who will not let you down by praising some one whom he knows is "persona non grata" with you; — such characters with the milk of human kindness in them redeem the situation. If there is one thing more than another we need it is tact and tact is from the Latin "tango", to touch.
