THE SCOTT ACT.—According to the St. John Telegraph, this is how they do business in Sussex: James Byrne, John Whelan and Joseph R. Leggett were, on the 15th, summoned before the Stipendiary Magistrate, Mr. Wallace, for a breach of the Scott Act. The case was opened, and the barrister for the defence asked the question: "Is not the Magistrate a witness in the case?" His Honor replied in the affirmative, and the case went by the board. The same parties were then summoned before two J. P.'s, Messrs. Blanchard and Farrar. On commencing the case, those "Justices" found they had been subpoenaed to give evidence in the matter also. They, therefore, called in other Justices to act on the case, who will, doubtless, be subpoenaed, and thus the farce will go on.
