

Council Members Question Aspects Of Wiring Project

The stoppage of work on the project of placing communication and street lighting lines underground on Water Street, until a verbal understanding with the Island Telephone Company is transferred into a written contract, was suggested at the Summerside Town Council meeting last evening following charges by Civic officials that very little co-operation has been shown by the contractor, in respect to the interests of the town in various aspects of the work which is already in progress.

According to council members, it has been the custom of the town to use the hard surface debris from street excavation as material from the present excavation as material for fill in repair work on streets in the town. It was said that when action was taken by the town to reclaim the material from the present excavation work on Water Street, Civic officials were told by the contractor that the town could have it by paying \$6.00 per truck load.

A check with the superintendent of the Telephone Company in regard to the matter revealed that no definite agreement had been discussed as to the disposal of the material, apart from an understanding that the debris would be removed from the street by the contractor.

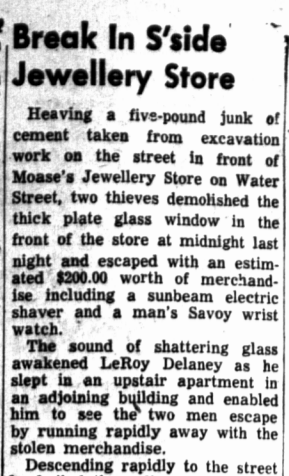
