TEA AT SOURIS—There is perhaps no place on Prince Edward Island more beautiful than Souris during the summer months, and the grounds adjoining the convent is an ideal spot for a tea party. This no doubt is one of the reasons that the Souris teas are always attended by large numbers of the best class of people, and are always a success. Another reason is, the committee in charge are men of experience in these matters, and do nothing by halves in procuring amusements for those who attend. The tea party of Monday was no exception. The grounds were never more beautiful, and as I heard a lady remark as she walked around, "Why Gertie, this looks like a fairy land." The Souris band rendered choice music and tendered their services gratuitously. Mutart's steam riding gallery was the centre of attraction and was a great drawing card for both old and young. It also served as a shelter during the showers of the afternoon. I understand the gross receipts were about \$1,300.

THE BAND CONCERT—Rare enjoyment was last night afforded the large number of people who assembled on Queen Square gardens to listen to the open air concert rendered by the 82nd Battalion band under the leadership of Professor Vinnicombe. A choice programme was performed without a hitch, the playing being something far superior to anything we have heretofore had in this line. Additions to the numbers of the instrumentalists have made the 82nd Battalion a strong band, and the reed instruments lately introduced have a very pleasing effect. The different selections were so enjoyed that rounds of applause greeted each number. It is to be hoped that some substantial means of encouragement will be given this fine band by those who should see that such a means of giving pleasure to the citizens is not overlooked. The attendance last night in the gardens was very large and it was noticed that instead of promenading the people stood still to listen to the music.
