The death occurred suddenly last night at the Prince Edward Island Hospital of Captain Murray L. Willigar, Master of the Wood Islands Caribou Ferry, Prince Nova. A native of Parrboro, N. S., he was 55 years of age. Captain Willigar entered hospital for treatment a week ago and had intended returning to his ship today but a sudden attack caused his death unexpectedly.

Increase Noted In Cars And Passengers On Wood Islands Ferry

While a decrease was registered in the number of trucks transported on the Northumberland Ferries last month, there was an appreciable increase in the number of passengers and passenger automobiles.

Last month there were 19,934 passengers compared to the 18,213 of the same month a year ago. During July there were 5,368 passenger automobiles carried and 969 trucks. In July of 1953 there were 4,792 autos and 1,117 trucks.

Since the beginning of the navigation season at the first of May there has been an increase of 1,591 passengers, 908 automobiles and a decrease of 477 trucks. The total figures this year to July 31 are 35,758 passengers, 10,019 autos and 2,402 trucks.

RECORD CARGO

PORT COLBORNE, Ont. (CP) - A record coal cargo for the Great Lakes has been established by the T. R. McLagan, Canada Steamship Lines' newest carrier. The McLagan passed through Port Colborne from Hamilton carrying 22,264.35 long tons, breaking the previous records held by the Sir James Dunn of the same company which was 20,240 long tons.

Arested In U. S. And Charged With Montreal Murder

MONTREAL, (CP) - Gerald Patrick McKuen, 34, Wednesday was charged with murder in the 1953 pistol-whipping slaying of Bert McAbbie, well known restaurant owner.

Judge T. A. Fontaine set preliminary hearing for Aug. 5. McKuen also charged with conspiracy to commit armed robbery, was arrested several weeks ago in Austin, Tex., and was deported by United States immigration authorities for illegal entry.

Leo Servant, 36; his sister Gertrude, 24; Roy Colligan, 28, and Jonathan (Slim) Dawn, 22, have already been charged with murder in connection with the case of McKuen's wife - a German-born divorcee he married in the United States - followed him to Canada and was in court for the arraignment.

Miss Servant will also appear for trial on a jailbreaking charge Aug. 3. She was recaptured Sunday in an isolated bush-land cottage 100 miles north of Montreal along with Georgette Tremblay, 41, after they escaped from Piquet Street jail five days earlier.

Police said four men and a woman tricked McAbbie into opening his restaurant after hours, beat him, and robbed him of \$3,500 cash and a \$1,500 diamond ring.

CITYTOWN ROTARIANS APPROVE BY THE CHIEF JUSTICE OF CANADA

With the assistance of the people of Canada and Divine guidance it is the hope of the Rotarians of this great country will merit your approval." Hon. Patrick Kerwin, Chief Justice of Canada said in addressing members of the Rotary Club and guests at a luncheon meeting in the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

Chief Justice Kerwin spoke on "Courts," and traced the two main stems on which the Canadian judiciary is based as received from English and French influences. "Courts are a necessity in every civilization," he said, "and a careful scrutiny of the two systems operating in Canada under the Common Law and the Quebec Civil Law, as brought from Paris years ago, discloses the same objective; justice between man and man."

Prior to the Norman conquest the population of England was sparse and the King took steps to bring the people under his rule. The expression "Establish the King's Peace," brought into use at that time, is still in use on certain documents. Some Courts had their genesis in France and were brought to England by the conquerors. One early court was called "Dusty Feet" because the people seeking legal advice were always in hurry.

The Chief Justice, in the various court established and the special laws with which they dealt, culminating with the Commissions of Assize travelling to all parts of the Kingdom. Finally in the interplay of patents, trade marks, agriculture and industry it became necessary for Parliament to enter into the picture, and endeavour to bring to an end the struggle of King, nobles and people to enact and enforce laws.

The Chief Justice explained the limitations of the Superior Courts of the Provinces, and the position of the Supreme Court of Canada as the highest Court of Appeal since appeals to the Privy Council have been discontinued.

The full bench of the Supreme Court of Canada now consists of nine judges. "Any final decision can come to the Supreme Court of Canada now," Chief Justice Kerwin said. "It is advisable not to leave decisions on important matters to a single judge."

New conditions give rise to new problems, tending to require new legislation due to pressure from the public. New laws are thus enacted as the general feeling throughout Canada desires them," the Chief Justice added. "People are not interested in general principles or every-day affairs. Litigants are only interested in matters touching themselves."

The Club members and guests were presented by Chief Justice Kerwin by Mr. Justice G. J. Tweedy who made fitting reference to his recent appointment and to his year-long vacation period spent in this Province for the past seven summers. "This club is highly honoured in having such a distinguished speaker make his first address here, following his elevation to the highest position in the Judiciary of Canada," Judge Tweedy said.

Mr. Cyrus Eaton, noted industrialist, banker and farmer will officially open the festivities of Old Home Week at the Charlottetown Drive-In Theatre and Provincial Exhibition which takes place August 9 to 14. Mr. Eaton is founder of Republic Steel Corporation, the third largest steel company in the United States, and of Fortmouth Steel Corporation. Mr. McPhee relates that "Cuddy" was fortunate in seeing every nut, bolt and connection placed in the new equipment.
