THE PARTY OF NO POLICY. All Canada is anxiously awaiting an authoritative announcement by the Opposition of a definite policy that can be understood. The Leader has spoken in the west, without result. Attention is now fixed upon the sub-lieutenant, who is speaking in the east. It was, a day or two ago, reported that Mr. Davies had actually formulated a policy at Woodstock, New Brunswick. Interest in it was at once, and everywhere, felt and expressed. But Mr. Davies has denied the report, and the country's expectations are shattered. The people are certainly entitled to a statement setting forth the lines upon which the tariff of Messrs. Laurier and Cartwright and Davies and their friends is to be drawn. They know now, by a long experience of nearly sixteen years, precisely what the effect of the National Policy is. The word "Protection can no longer be used as a bugaboo to frighten the people. They see prices cheaper than ever. They know that Canada stands now, as a whole, in a relatively better position, commercially and fiscally, than any other country upon earth. Still, few persons are aware as well as they would like to do. Everyone naturally feels, to some extent, the effects of the great depression that has prevailed alike in Great Britain, the United States, Australia, and in every other country to a greater extent than in Canada, where not one bank or carefully managed monetary or business establishment has become bankrupt, while hundreds, and thousands, have elsewhere tottered to their fall. If the other party can show, in a reasonable way, that they can institute a policy under which better results will be obtained than have been obtained under the National Policy, the people ought to know it. They ought to know it clearly before they vote to make an exchange. But they will not, if they are wise, vote to make an exchange before they have been shown and convinced that the proposed new policy is a better one than the old. They will bear those who have rather than fly to those who know not of it. They will not "buy a pig in a poke." The devil they don't know. Under these circumstances, the Opposition leaders ought not longer to expound theories and talk platitudes about Free Trade and Protection—they ought not to pretend to remain the Party of No Policy. Such a party will not be trusted by the intelligent people of Canada.

HALF A CENTURY AGO.

As the Roman Catholics of this city have been for some time past collecting funds for the erection of a new Cathedral to take the place of the present one, which has for a number of years proved too small to accommodate the large and growing Catholic population of the parish, they will be pleased to learn of the prompt manner in which their fathers and grandfathers responded to an appeal for aid to build the present St. Dunstan's Cathedral. Just fifty-two years ago today (December 4, 1842) the subject of raising funds to erect the present Cathedral was brought to the notice of the parishioners by the parish priest, and the liberal manner in which they responded to his appeal will be seen in the following paragraph taken from the issue of the Colonial Herald for December 10, 1842: "The Roman Catholic Chapel in this town having been found, for some time past, much too small to accommodate the congregation who steadily worship in that place, the necessity of a strenuous and united effort being promptly made to remedy this inconvenience was pointed out to the congregation on Sunday last by the Rev. Mr. Reynolds, parish priest, followed up by an appropriate and forcible appeal, in which the rev. gentleman urged upon his hearers the propriety of immediately commencing a subscription towards the object contemplated. This appeal was responded to with a liberality which some of our Protestant brethren would do well to imitate, the sum of eight hundred and twenty-four pounds having been subscribed in the course of a single hour."

SOUTH SHIPMENT NOTES.

In port and loading: Schr Nutwood, 99 tons, loading for Halifax, potatoes; Sch Rosebush, 92 tons, loading for Boston, potatoes; Sch Henry J. Ives, 60 tons, loading for Halifax, potatoes; Delight, 169 tons, St. Pierre, general cargo; Loraine C, 63 tons, loading for La Have, potatoes; Mysotic, 93 tons, loading for Boston, potatoes; Volunteer, 99 tons, loading for Boston, potatoes. The sch Genesta arrived in port this morning from Malpeque, partly loaded and will complete her cargo here for Boston. The eastern portion of King's County had a full average crop of potatoes this year, and they have been cellared in good order and are keeping well. The above vessels will all complete loading before the 5th inst., and should no other vessels arrive before that date for cargoes, a large quantity of potatoes will have to remain on hand during the winter. WAR IN THE EAST.

As has already been intimated through THE EXAMINER, so settled is the belief among diplomats that Pekin will be captured in a few weeks, and with its fall will disappear the last vestige of the present Tartar-Chinese dynasty, that speculation is already indulged in regarding the succession. Li Hung Chang is too old to take the reins of government, and his only son is an imbecile. His adopted son, his nephew, is, on the contrary, a man of brilliant attainments, who has recently represented the Chinese government in Japan. He is known as Prince Li. Not only did he ably represent China at the Tokyo court, but he succeeded to a greater extent than his predecessors in gaining both the affection and confidence of the Japanese people. It is believed in Washington that the house of Li Hung Chang would be favored by the Japanese government as successor to the reigning dynasty.

A Washington despatch says the report that Minister Denby had appealed for help is confirmed. On Monday Mr. Gresham left for London, and the American minister protection was required, and the department called Admiral Carpenter to deliver a draft of fifty marines at Tien-Tsin. The admiral, however, has failed to receive the order, for early on the 27th a cablegram was received announcing the departure of the Baltimore for Nagasaki, where she arrived two days later. It is stated that the American minister and state departments are much chagrined over Admiral Carpenter's action in this matter, only mildly expressing the feeling. While it is well known in Washington that no objection is made on Chinese territory, it is day, the flagship is leisurely coaling at the pleasant port of Nagasaki, and the second important ship of the fleet, the Chester, has been over a month at Chemulpo Joca, where there is no vestige of danger to American interests, as the strong Japanese force there is maintaining the best of order. It is known that some sharp messages have been sent to the admiral the past few days and that he has been directed to send the Charleston to the Chinese Coast. Minister Denby is also authorized to transfer the legation to Tien-Tsin.

A Chefoo despatch to the Times says that a Chinaman who escaped from Port Arthur states that there were six generals of equal authority in command there. All fought bravely, but were defeated by lack of unity in their plans. All the troops were thoroughly demoralized and they fled. Two of the generals have arrived at Chefoo. One is still in hiding, another has gone to Tien-Tsin, where he fears a great risk of being beheaded. It is reported that the Japanese fleet is desirous of taking a more prominent part in the war. The fleet was seen off Wei Hai Wei, but now has disappeared. The Chinese fleet is still inside the harbor. The people fear that if the place is taken the disbanded troops will commit outrages. In ten days' time all traffic northward will close. The Japanese will have to act quickly if they intend to attack Pekin. The last reliable report received in Chefoo states that Japan has informed the American minister that she is willing to negotiate if China sees for peace. This China has done, so an armistice is likely to be arranged.

Mr. Deiring, the envoy, who visited Japan for the purpose of negotiating peace, and whose mission proved a failure, the prime minister declining to meet him, has written a private letter to the minister denying that he was sent to Japan by Li Hung Chang.

SCHOOL BOARD MEETING.—At the meeting of the City School Board last evening it was decided that the Christmas holidays extend from the 21st of December until the 2nd of January. Miss Linda Magder, a teacher in the Kent School, tendered her resignation, to take effect on Dec. 31st. The principal's reports show an enrollment of 1,407, an increase of 24 over last month. The percentage of attendance in the three schools was 85, viz., Prince Street, 88; West Kent, 85; Queen Square, 81. The number of cases of tardiness was 564, an increase of 100 over last month. The number of visits made by the teachers to the homes of the pupils was 76, the highest made by any one teacher being 21. There were 22 cases of corporal punishment. In this connection an order was made by the board that the Principal's inquirer into the cause and nature of offences calling for such punishment, and report upon the same to the Board at the regular monthly meeting.
