PROVINCIAL PROHIBITION.

SOME of the Liberal papers and some of the Liberal prohibitionists have revived the cry for Provincial Prohibition. It will have been observed that the Minister of Justice does not say that a Province of Canada can prohibit the importation or manufacture of liquors. The minister merely says that the Province can stop the sale. This would be a mammoth and ineffective sort of prohibition. Even if each of the Provinces respectively could enforce a prohibitory law the most of them are in such financial straits, as a result of Liberal rule, that they are not in a position to do so. The cry for Provincial Prohibition is the merest numbing. Provincial Prohibition is not to be thought of for a moment. With neighbouring Provinces under license, the difficulty and the expense of enforcing a prohibitory law and stopping drunkenness would be very great. While the power to do so would be weak and unstable.

So far as Prince Edward Island is concerned the people of Charlottetown have only to vote in the Scott Act again and the whole Province will be under a prohibitory law as extensive in its operation as any Provincial Prohibitory law could be made. As for the other Provinces it would be the height of folly to abandon National Prohibition in the face of a national majority in favor of it. This cry for Provincial Prohibition has been raised simply and solely for the purpose of enabling the members of the government to get out of the hole into which they have fallen after having dug it themselves.

CONDITIONS AT KLONDIKE

Speaking of the conditions as he found them in Klondike, Mr. J. B. Tyrrell, the eminent explorer of the Geological Survey, said to a Montreal Gazette correspondent that much of the discontent and disappointment among the floating population in Dawson is traceable to the unfitness of the people themselves to contend with the conditions of a mining camp. "I will give you an instance," continue Mr. Tyrrell. "When I was on my way into Dawson I met a surveyor coming out in a very dejected mood. He declared he found it impossible to get a day's employment at his profession, and there was nothing for him but to get back to the East. Not long after that I was at work surveying along the creek, and I must have had a dozen applications to survey claims at \$50 each. I found that the two surveyors in Dawson were making \$200 a day, and had work ahead for fully two months. My disappointed friend had evidently not gone the right way about making himself professionally known in the camp."

Mr Tyrrell says the conditions under which gold is found indicate its deposit there by glacial action, but it will take some study to definitely account for its occurrence. On the creek claims many of the nuggets are worn quite smooth, while on the bench claims on the hillside the coarse gold is rugged and sharp, as if directly torn from the lode, and shows no trace of attrition whatever. "I happened to be present on the El Dorado claim when the biggest nugget found this year was taken out," said Mr Tyrrell. "In shape and dimensions it resembled a good-sized early rose potato, and was worth \$400."

Mr Tyrrell says that no quartz veins have been located as yet in the Klondike country. The richness of the district, he believes, has not been exaggerated, but probably the vastness of the gold-bearing area has been overestimated. Mr Tyrrell brought back with him a box full of gravel just as it was taken from one of the bench claim workings. So rich is it that the "dirt" shows to be plentifully studded with gold.

Montreal Gazette: It has been suggested that the instability of the plebiscite returns in this province is due to the fact that it is not known what majority the Government really wants. Mr. Tarte in Toronto said he expected the Quebec majority against prohibition would be about 90,000. The Solei and people who furnish it with returns will please note the figures.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Some of the Liberal papers are rejoicing over a new point that has been raised, viz that the Dominion Parliament has no power to pass a prohibitory liquor law. It seems to us that this point ought to have been fully considered before the plebiscite was held at a cost of \$250,000.

—The Czar's message, setting forth his proposals for universal peace, has proved a good thing for him. It appears that the great inventor, Nobel, bequeathed to the League of Peace ten millions, stipulating that the sum should be given to the person who "did the most or the best for the cause of peace." It is now stated that the League has decided to present the Nobel prize—noble in amount as well as in name to the Emperor Nicholas for his magnanimous initiative. He will probably buy an armed cruiser with this comfortable legacy.
