PRECIOUS METALS.

Gold and Platinum Are Cheap Compared With Some of Them.

"The majority of people when asked to name the most precious metals usually mention gold as first, platinum as second and silver as third," said the proprietor of a large assaying and refining establishment to the writer recently.

"We will now compare these prices with those of the rarer and less well known metals. To take them in alphabetical order barium, the metal which Davy isolated from its ore, baryta, in 1808, sells for \$950 a pound when it is sold at all, and calcium is worth \$1,800 a pound.

"Gluconic is worth \$250 per ounce; indium, \$150; iridium, \$658 a pound; janthanium, \$175, and lithium, \$160 per ounce. Nidium costs \$128 per ounce; osmium, palladium, platinum, potassium and rhodium bring respectively \$640, \$400, \$130, \$32 and \$519 per pound. Strontium costs \$128 an ounce; tantalum, \$144; titanium, \$9; thorium, \$272; vanadium, \$320; yttrium, \$144, and zirconium, \$250 an ounce.

"Thus we see that the commonly received opinion as to what are the most precious metals is quite erroneous. Barium is nearly four times as valuable as gold and gallium more than 160 times as costly, while many of the other metals mentioned are twice and thrice as valuable. Aluminium, which cost \$8 and \$9 a pound in 1890, is now produced as cheaply as are iron, zinc, lead and copper.

The Atmospheric Clock.

The atmospheric clock—a sort of device that goes of itself—is not inaptly termed a perpetual hourglass. In appearance it is like a long thermometer with the bulb of mercury at the bottom. The glass tube is about three-eighths of an inch in diameter and secured to the frame by two bands through which it passes easily. The divisions of time are marked on each side of the tube. Inside the glass tube is a smaller tube shaped very much as an hourglass. Some mercury and a scrap of blotting paper for the purpose of taking up any moisture that might gather in the tube are placed at each end.

The mercury in the top end of the tube is placed opposite the mark of the proper time and falls to the bottom of the tube exactly as the time passes. When it has run out from the top, the frame can be turned and the mercury set to time on the other side. Thus it registers the seconds and hours quite as accurately as any other timepiece—the drawback to such an arrangement being, of course, the turning of the frame, a task as irksome as that of winding a clock.—Exchange.

Most of Them Paid.

A large company of easily gullible individuals was victimized a short time back in a small country town. By means of posters announcing a grand sacred concert and by a free distribution of complimentary tickets bearing on their face this condition, "No Gentleman Admitted Unless Accompanied by a Lady," a large audience was gathered at the theater. When the crowd began to press in through the doors, the ticket taker began shouting:

"All having complimentary tickets will please pass up stairs to the gallery."

This was a dark, dreary, hot place, not having the capacity for seating comfortably more than 100 people. Those who pressed forward with their tickets were told that if they did not wish to go to the gallery they could be admitted by paying a shilling apiece. Every man who appeared with a complimentary ticket of course had a lady with him and felt a sort of embarrassment if she were not his wife or intimate acquaintance, so he yielded to compulsion and paid rather than retire, and so the scheme succeeded to the extent of filling the house.—London Answers.
