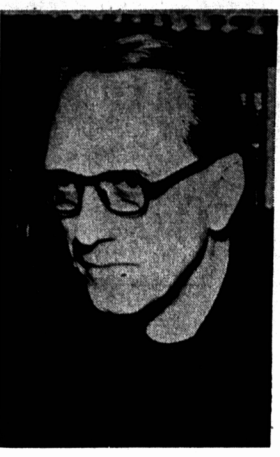

ADDRESS ON COMMUNITY PLANNING AT JOINT DINNER LAST EVENING

The P. E. Island Division of the Community Planning Association and the Charlottetown Board of Trade had Sir Brian Dunfield as their guest speaker at a joint dinner meeting in the Charlottetown Hotel last evening. In the course of his address Sir Brian said, "We are missionaries in the field of endeavor to plan better surroundings in our cities, towns and villages throughout Canada. When I tell you that 360 miles of new housing was planned and successfully carried out on a well designed program in Canada last year, you may visualize the effect of care now, in planning for future expansion at city or village level."

He described as "wonderful" in speaking of the countryside on the island which he saw in a scenic drive yesterday and stressed the clean, well-kept highly cultivated farms, all of which contributed to the real value of "home." Attention was drawn to the expansion of the community planning movement which now has chapters in every province in Canada. The organization is approved and subsidized by the Dominion Government and also by each provincial government, so that "we are getting somewhere in the planning field."

He suggested that with two substantial Charlottetown and Summerside, and a number of smaller towns and incorporated villages on the island, that a professional town planning man could be of value and his employment would result in much good. In describing the effect of town planning at Cornerbrook, Nfld., as an illustration, he said that the allowance shall not be paid during the period that a recipient is a patient or a resident in a hospital, nursing home or private, charitable or public institution. Summer Short On Rain & Sunshine

People of the Province yesterday bade farewell to the summer of 1954 as it officially ended. It was noted, according to statistics compiled by Mr. Warren A. Burns at the Experimental Farm, that the summer was noted for both a low average rainfall and a below average amount of sunshine.

The warmest day of the summer was June 22 when the temperature reached 84 degrees. July was the warmest month with an average temperature of 68.2 degrees. The rainfall was below average every month excepting July when the precipitation was 4.50 inches. It is believed that September, if it may be considered a summer month, will be the driest as up to last night the precipitation was only .22.

The hours of sunshine were down for every month this summer. June had 210 hours against an average for that month of 228.8 hours. July had 206.9 hours compared to the average of 240.8, and August had 199.5 hours against an average of 226.8. Mr. Burns expressed the opinion that September may prove above the average but the figures would not be available until after the end of the month.
