A general meeting of the executive and directors of the Summerside Amateur Athletic Association was held in the Town Hall last night with president D. O. Stewart in the chair. The meeting was a very enthusiastic one and a few difficulties were ironed out, restoring complete harmony among the leaders of this new athletic movement in Summerside.

The opinion was voiced that the matter of constructing the new press box and canteen was entered upon without many of the directors and executive knowing about it but it was explained that existing conditions were such that the work had to be done quickly or not at all and as a really fine bargain was obtained on the proposition it was thought that the leaders would be excused for going ahead without consulting all concerned. The meeting was unanimous that this was true.

A supervisory committee consisting of Norman MacDonald, Bob Schurman and Jimmie Hogan was appointed to oversee the

work of coaching minors. It was decided that after the baseball stands were enclosed there would be an admission charge of 25 cents for adults, and that school children would be admitted free and would be under proper supervision so as not to interfere with the adults in the enjoyment of the game.

In the absence of Eric Campbell, softball chairman, the subject was discussed generally by the meeting and it was felt that the softball field would soon be ready for play.
