Let's Talk It Over
A Prince County Viewpoint

Mayce Henry Wedge of Summerside is, we have been given to understand, the leading spirit in a new \$18,000 venture which is concerned largely, though not entirely, with sports activities for the boys and girls, young men and women of our town. A meeting of some of the prominent sport figures of Summerside and the R. C. A. F. Station met with His Worship recently and a plan was drawn up, which, if the Council approves it and this seems fairly certain, will be an important step in the right direction insofar as looking after the physical program of the youth of Summerside is concerned.

In the area of ground between the new hospital and the high school, a section recently purchased by the town, you can take a bow for that, gentlemen there will be a baseball park, two softball diamonds, a football field, a cinder track, tennis courts and club rooms complete with showers, dressing rooms and other necessary facilities for the sports to be played. In addition to all this there is to be a children's playground, and a park for adults who have travelled beyond the athletic stage and like to spend a quiet hour in the out-of-doors.

As we have said above, the venture is a long forward step and Mayor Wedge, the man who conceived the idea, is to be especially commended. It is only a step, and the road ahead to an adequate youth program for both summer and winter in Summerside is rough and fraught with considerable difficulty. To attain the heights, however, one must take the first step, and that is all anyone can do at the very outset of a journey.

Winter facilities for athletic endeavour in Summerside are still virtually non-existent. The Kinsmen have made valiant efforts to provide outdoor skating for the children, and considering the blighting effect of adverse weather conditions their efforts have been worthwhile.

Next winter, however, the town is faced with the situation of having no indoor rink in addition to its not having a gymnasium or any building in which a game of basketball can be played. Thus, if the new summer program goes through, we shall be considerably ahead of many towns our size in summer, and hopelessly behind them in winter—an anomalous condition surely, and one which we feel confident the Town Fathers will do everything in their power to remedy as their ambitious program for town betterment gains momentum.

So let us commend, and not criticize. Rome was not built in a day, and as long as the builders are "on the job" we can look to the future with some measure of hope.

HAL WALLIS SUSPENSE DRAMA TRUE STORY OF LOVE CRIME

Chief Justice Is Speaker At Kinsmen Club

Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell was the guest speaker at the regular meeting of the Kinsmen Club of Summerside held last evening at Coyle's Restaurant. After recalling that he had spoken at the charter meeting of the Summerside Club and had later addressed Kinsmen clubs in Charlottetown and Saskatoon, he said that he has been following with interest the activities of this club since its foundation.

Chief Justice Campbell introduced his topic as "Trees and the contribution of trees to literature." He quoted from a number of works of prose and poetry in which trees had inspired the authors to heights of literary expression. Approaching the practical side of the question, Chief Justice Campbell quoted Carter's observation when he described this island as "full of beautiful trees and meadows," and went on to say that forests here have been depleted almost to the danger point.

place near Sinulju in the north-west corner of Korea.

Three Russian-built Mig jets were shot down and three more were damaged by U. S. Sabre jets. There were no immediate reports of American losses, if any.

Other Allied planes in 700 sorties by nightfall hammered communication routes and flew close cover over the western front where Lt-Gen. Mathew B. Ridgway's drive north of 38 was under way.

(Reuters news agency reported that British and Australians in the west, struck forward to within two miles of the parallel.)

Action was light across most of the front Tuesday.

South Korean troops pushed across the Imjin River on the extreme west flank northwest of Seoul.

Allied patrols to the east met light resistance in the Yongsong area.

Field dispatches said the American drive north of 38 was not a full sweep along the 10-mile sector. But where troops did not cover in force there was active patrolling. The Chinese were entrenched north of the parallel in this area.

Farther east American, Greek and Thai (Siamese) troops advanced through swirls of dust to within one and one-quarter miles of the parallel, north of Chunchon.

524 respectively. For the full fiscal year ending next March 31, Mr. Boucher predicted revenue of \$46,422,917 and expenditures of \$46,136,466.

These higher totals, as compared with those for the last fiscal year ended Oct. 31, 1950, reflected the change in bookkeeping methods. In that year revenue amounted to \$30,871,720 and expenditure to \$29,113,491 leaving an ordinary account surplus of \$1,758,229.

The largest items of anticipated revenue for the new fiscal year are \$12,955,921 from the Dominion, \$7,500,000 from the social services and education tax and \$5,500,000 from liquor sales. The largest items of estimated expenditure are \$8,939,000 for old age and blind pensions and mothers' allowances, \$8,199,516 for public works and \$6,165,000 for education.

Mr. Boucher said that henceforth New Brunswick's annual financial statement will be presented in June instead of January.

He said the Province is aiming at a "pay as you go" plan in its financing this year. Much of the expenditure on highways will be paid for out of current revenues instead of being capitalized.
