Food is not available. They'll eat almost anything even to cleaning the meat off the bodies of crows that have been shot in late fall or early winter until there is nothing but the bare bones left.

Undoubtedly some birds have been lost this winter due to severe weather conditions but considering the intensity of the storms that swept the province in January, February and early March the losses sustained were surprisingly small.

The deer released in the province last summer are continuing to attract wide interest in the areas to which they have been transferred. It may be truthfully said that many local residents have literally fallen in love with their sleek grey immigrants to our shores.

All Trot and Pace, purse \$1,500, three dashes at one mile each, to be raced Thanksgiving Day. The Directors of Truro Raceway, Ltd., state that they wish to encourage the raising of more colts in the Maritimes and are happy to announce that entry blanks will be going out shortly for the Jolly Three Year Old Pace (foaled in Canada) for foals of 1952 to race in 1953 for a guaranteed purse of \$5,000.

For those who wish to keep in touch with the big events of the harness horse world that will be raced this season the following are the dates and estimated purses: The Hambletonian Three Year Old Trot, Goshen, N.Y., August 8, \$90,000; the Little Brown Jug, Three Year Old Pace, Delaware, Ohio, Sept. 18, \$65,000; the Rosebud, Westbury, N.Y., Sept. 11, \$50,000; the Westbury, N.Y. National Pacing Derby, Roosevelt Raceway, July 3, \$25,000, and the Westbury, N.Y. Trotting Championship, Roosevelt Raceway, July 24, \$25,000. For the owners of really fast class trotters and pacers there are exceptional opportunities to make good money in the racing game. In the past few years because of the great prosperity of the pari-mutuel tracks in the U. S. A. the chances to race for big stakes have multiplied tremendously.

Once again Secretary-Treasurer W. G. Gillespie has come up with a tremendous entry list, which appears below, for the Prince Edward Island Harness Racing Club's Futurity Stakes to be raced this year. A total of 30 entries has been made in the Two Year Old Trot and Pace, 16 in the Three Year Old Trot and 30 in the Three Year Old Pace, an aggregate of 76 paid up nominations. Later on when the two-year-olds have established their gait they will race as two year old trotters and two year old pacers, we presume. Remembering last year's very successful meeting in which 76 records were set up, we predict equal success for this season. Our congratulations to the presi-

dent, Dr. R. F. Seaman, and his very hard working secretary, W. G. Gillespie.

Island Rinks To Play In Montreal

Prince Edward Island will be represented at the Canadian Branch of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club Centennial Trophy Bonspiel to be held in Montreal, March 27, 28 and 29 by three rinks, Mr. J. Finley MacLeod announced yesterday.

The Island rinks will be skipped by Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, representing the Provincial Association, J. F. MacLeod of the Charlottetown Club, and Willard MacDonald of the Summerside Club.

Some 192 curlers will take the ice at one time. 24 sheets will be available with matches being played at the following clubs: The Caledonia, The Royal Montreal, The Thistle, The Heather, St. George's, Outremont, Montreal West and Lachine. There will be three curling sessions a day, play starting at 10 A.M. Each team entered is guaranteed six games. All curlers will be guests of the Canadian Branch of the R.C.C. at a banquet to be held during the bonspiel.
