Logan vs. Palmer.

The article published in yesterday's GUARDIAN, Logan vs. D. W. Palmer, taken from the Monetary Times, turns out to be a one-sided and distorted report, and we regret its re-production in this paper. It is deeply to be regretted that a paper of the standing of the Monetary Times should allow its columns to be used in such a manner, and we hope that that journal and the numerous papers throughout Canada which copied the article will see fit to make the amende honorable by reproducing the original judgment, as given by Mr. Justice Alley, which we cheerfully publish in this issue.

The Other Side of the Case.

SIR,—Your paper of today contained an article purporting to be a report from the Toronto Monetary Times of a case recently tried in P. E. Island—Logan vs. Palmer. This report is replete with falsehoods and misleading statements. It is not only false and libelous as against the defendant in the suit in whose favor judgment was rendered, but was written and published broadcast over Canada with no other apparent design than to slander the entire business community as well as the administration of Justice in this Province. To even a casual reader it bears internal evidence of the malice that dictated its publication, and I am therefore surprised that a journalist with ordinary discernment and business experience should publish such a tissue of falsehood without any effort to investigate the truth. I am especially surprised that a paper claiming an elevated journalistic status as the GUARDIAN does, and posing as a guardian of good morals, should degrade itself by publishing such a gross libel on the community as is embodied in this article.

A written judgment in this suit was read and filed in open court on the 8th of January last, which you could have heard when delivered, or could have since read at any time on application at the office of the County Court if desirous of ascertaining the facts of the case. As will appear from that judgment which is now sent to you for publication Mr. Henry Coombs who was agent of the plaintiff was the principal witness with suit and upon his credibility its issue in a great measure depended. With this fact I need offer no further explanation regarding its result, except what the judgment itself discloses. I will however say that those who know Henry will appreciate the moral to the Monetary Times report, which you have omitted for reasons best known to yourself: "Be careful who you credit in P. E. Island." In conclusion I may state that the judgment was given in open court in the presence of counsel for both sides. No appeal was applied for either then or at any time.

LOGAN vs. D. W. PALMER.

This action was brought on an acceptance for \$13.80, which the defendant denies having signed, and which was given for some soap which defendant denies having bought.

There is no evidence to contradict the defendant's sworn statement that he did not accept the draft. Henry Coombs, agent for the plaintiff, says it was signed in his store—that he gave it to Percy Palmer, defendant's son, who took it into the office and brought it out with defendant's signature—and that he, Coombs, did not see defendant then, or try to see him. On this evidence plaintiff's case must fall on the acceptance. Then plaintiff claims to recover on the original consideration. Henry Coombs swears that, as agent of plaintiff, he sold the soap to defendant in his shop on 17th Sept., 1885, and produced a book with an entry of the transaction charged to defendant. Defendant swears that he never bought the soap, and never heard of the transaction until Coombs spoke to him of it on the street, and that he then distinctly told him he knew nothing about it, but that if he (Coombs) had any message for Percy he would deliver it. Some evidence has been given in proof of the shipment of the soap, but it does not touch the matter in dispute. There can be no doubt that the soap was shipped and delivered to Percy Palmer, as agent of the Steam Boat Co. at Victoria, but it is not further traced to defendant. In this matter there is a direct contradiction between the testimony of Coombs and defendant, and in view of the fact that the transaction occurred in 1885, now over six years ago, and that no suit was brought for it until this long period of time had elapsed, and after Percy Palmer, the principal witness who could throw light on the matter, had left the country, I cannot give judgment in plaintiff's favor.

Canadian Horses in England.

Canadian horses have been doing well at London sales of late. At Aldridge's last week they realized such prices as thirty eight guineas and thirty six guineas apiece, as against thirty two and thirty guineas for English horses of similar breeds. This fact leads the Live Stock Journal to lecture English breeders thus: The Canadian horses sold at Aldridge's fetched such good prices from London postmasters of experience as to suggest a danger to the home business if we do not take the utmost precaution for the protection of the latter. The Atlantic freight and insurance have to be met as a second charge by the Canadians ere they reach the English market; and calculating this at the very lowest at £10 a horse, the British breeder and raiser of choice horses has a distinct advantage if he likes to take it. We note, however some concerted or associated action amongst the home breeders of this class of horse.—London Canadian Gazette.
