### Admits Error In Reporting Record Time

NEW YORK (AP)—Coach Rut Walter of Northwestern University admitted Saturday he erred in applying for recognition of a world record matching 9.3 seconds for the 100 yards by sprinter Jim Golliday.

This was reported by Secretary Dan Ferris of the Amateur Athletic Union. Golliday actually did 9.2, his coach and Ferris now agree.

"I discussed the matter with Walter," Ferris said. "And he acknowledged that, due to an oversight, the wrong time was submitted."

"Here is actually what happened. There were four timers, three regulars and one alternate. The alternate's time is considered only when that of one of the regulars is in doubt. In this case two of the three regular timers caught Golliday at 9.2. The other had it at 9.3. So did the alternate."

"Through an oversight, one of the regular timers, who timed Golliday at 9.2, was listed as the alternate while the alternate, who had a 9.3 time, was listed as a regular. We caught the error, and corrected it. It was an honest mistake and I think everything now is straightened out to everybody's satisfaction."

### Canada & Reds Enter Olympics

CORTINA D'AMPEZZA, Italy. (Reuters)—Canada, the world and Olympic champion, and the Soviet Union, 1954 world champion, were among 11 countries entered for the 1956 Olympic ice hockey championship when entries closed Thursday night.

The championship will be decided during the winter Olympics here from Jan. 26 to Feb. 5. Other entries are the United States, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Germany, Italy, Norway, Sweden and Switzerland.

MEDAN, Sumatra (AP)—Darul Islam bandits captured a small town and killed 100 persons in a series of rebel raids in North Sumatra, police and military authorities announced Thursday. They said outlaws took the town of Reunom and killed all members of the Moslem peasant's Perti political party in sight, hurling the bodies into nearby rivers. The party is Communist-dominated.

TORONTO (CP)—Canada's new citizens have been asked not to take part in a series of demonstrations against a delegation of Russian church officials soon expected here as guests of the United Church of Canada. Stan Misiak, president of the Mutual Co-operation League, appealed for restraint at a special conference of 21 ethnic groups in Toronto. Any demonstrations against the Russians, he said, would do more harm than good.

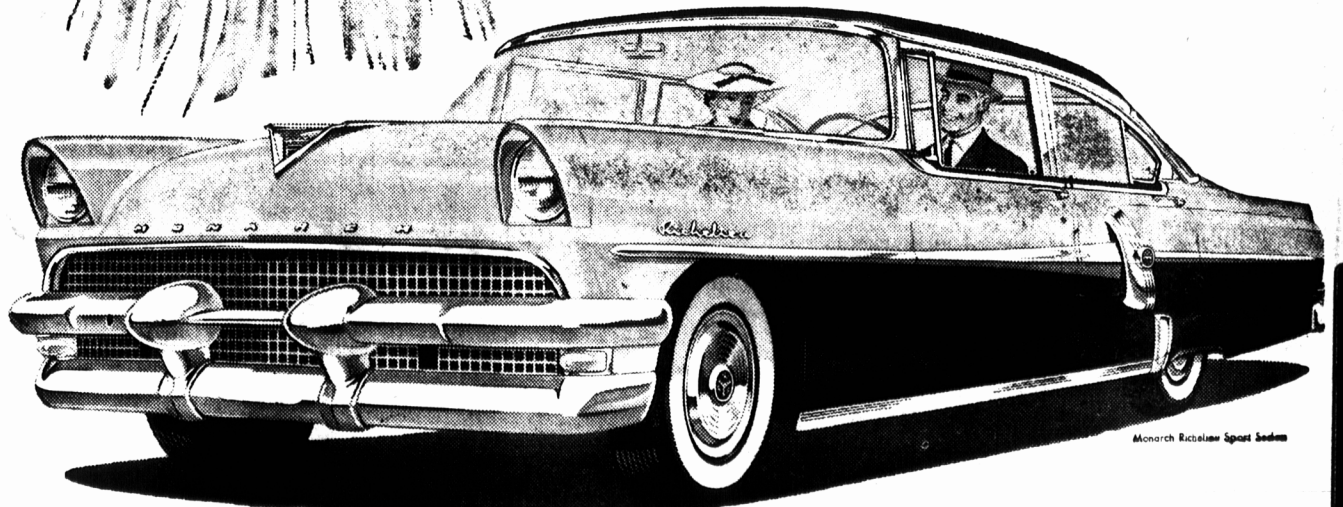
