Former Army Man Gets Tough Textile Assignment

OTTAWA (CP)—A former army major with a flare for promotional work has been picked for a tough new assignment: to help expand the \$2,500,000 Canadian textile market for Canadian products and help coax consumers away from highly-publicized imports.

The trade department announced Wednesday that J. P. C. Gauthier, 37-year-old assistant director of the department's commodities branch, has resigned to become general manager of the newly-organized Canadian Fabrics Foundation.

The foundation, with headquarters in Montreal, was established by leaders of Canada's textile industry as a possible answer to stem the rising flow of textile imports.

Working with top fashion designers and Canadian mills, the foundation will tell the story of Canadian fabrics through newspapers, radio and movies and by providing educational material to schools and Universities across the country.

Modern Fairy Tale Romance Comes To Life

VENICE, Italy (Reuters) — A modern fairy tale romance came to life here Wednesday when lovely, 15-year-old Princess Ira Fuerstenberg married her handsome prince, 31-year-old Alfonso Hohenlohe, in a ceremony befitting Europe's "wedding-of-the-year."

Hundreds of important guests, including 300 princes and princesses crowded into the tiny Renaissance Church of San Sebastiano decked out with pink and white roses and white satin-covered pillars.

The young bride stood before the altar dressed in a severely-cut Jacques Griffe white tulle dress with an enormous train. They took their vows in both Latin and German before Friar Sigmund Strachwitz, a relation of the Fuerstenbergs.

In the first rows of pews reserved for the bride and bridegroom's families sat Ira's parents, Prince Fuerstenberg and Princess Donna Clara Fuerstenberg, and Prince Hohenlohe and Princess Maria Hohenlohe.

U. N. Officials At Trouble Spot

JERUSALEM (Reuters) — Unarmed United Nations officials Wednesday night took up positions in a new trouble spot along the Israeli-Egyptian border under orders from chief UN truce supervisor Maj.-Gen. E. L. M. Burns to form a "living wall" in the El Auja demilitarized zone.

Armed only with blue and white UN armbands and flags, they patrolled the zone.

The Canadian truce chief sent them along the international border in white jeeps bearing the three-foot-high letters "UN" to prevent a possible clash between the two sides at El Auja, which overnight has become the frontier's most sensitive area.

Gen. Burns demanded immediate withdrawal of Israeli troops who early Wednesday entered the 100-square-mile demilitarized zone at El Auja, about 20 miles south of the Gaza strip.

Alouettes May Lose Ray Cicia

MONTREAL (CP)—Ray Cicia, 200-pound guard with Montreal Alouettes, may be lost to the football club for the remainder of the season.

Cicia suffered a broken arm Saturday in a game against Hamilton. He underwent an operation Tuesday to set the ulna—large bone in the forearm. Dr. Gordon Young, club physician, said Cicia will be out of action at least a month.

This could mean he will be lost to the club for the remainder of the season since the team must decide by Oct. 15 on the 16 imports it plans to use.

Jim Stalon, towering American tackle released earlier by Alouettes, has been recalled to help fill the breach.
