Police Catch Thief Leaving Store With Goods; Remanded

Electing trial by magistrate and pleading guilty to break and entry, Basil John Perry, Charlottetown, was remanded until July 10 for sentencing by Magistrate A.J. Haslam in city police court yesterday.

Perry, not represented by counsel, is charged with breaking and entering Kelly and MacIntosh Men's Wear store on Great George Street and committing the indictable offence of theft.

The charge arose out of a break and entry which was reported to the city police shortly before midnight Sunday. Proceeding to the location, Sgt. Lloyd Wakelin and Const. Leo MacDougal arrested the accused as he was leaving the store.

In his possession, Perry had a man's suit, several pairs of socks and some men's underclothing valued at over \$50. Entry into the building had apparently been made by breaking the glass in the front entrance and it was the sound of breaking glass that prompted some person in one of the neighboring buildings to put in the call to the police.
