Trouble Brewing for the Americans.

BUYING NEW WARSHIPS FOR THE PERUVIAN NAVY.

Serious Differences Have Existed for Twelve Years.

NEW YORK, August 2.—On the Panama liner Advance, which reached this port today, was Com. Carlos Ferreros, of the Peruvian navy, who is en route to Paris for the purpose of purchasing warships for the Peruvian navy. Rumors had been current at Panama prior to July 21, when Com. Ferreros arrived from Gallao, concerning a strong agitation throughout Peru against the United States, owing to differences between the two countries existing since 1885. President Pierola, at the opening of the Peruvian congress last Thursday, said that the foreign relations of the government were friendly, with the exception of an issue raised between Peru and the United States dating from 1885. President Pierola added that Peru had been compelled to accept arbitration under somewhat vexatious conditions in order to avoid a rupture and that negotiations were still pending with the United States respecting a modification of tariffs.

**PEACE NEGOTIATIONS PROCEED SLOWLY.**  
Spain Reluctant to Accept the Conditions.

MILITARY OPERATIONS WILL BE CONTINUED AS USUAL.

Several Regiments will go Aboard Transports for Porto Rico.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—The President and the French Ambassador had a conference yesterday afternoon, but were unable to reach a conclusion as to the acceptance by Spain of the peace conditions laid down by the President.

They bound themselves to the observance of the strictest secrecy as to proceedings, until further progress has been made.

Meantime, in keeping with the declared purpose of the President at the beginning of overtures, this conference is not operating to restrain military operations in any degree.

Orders went out yesterday for a conference of the leaders of the regiments accompanying General Wade to Porto Rico, and within 24 hours some of the troops for this expedition will be boarding the transports at Newport News.

**Wants a Larger Force.**

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2.—Gen Merriam has received from the war department word that Gen Merritt has asked to have his command increased from 20,000 to 50,000 troops, in order to be able to meet any emergency which may arise on account of the hostile attitude of Aguinaldo and the insurgents.

**They Have Snow in Nebraska.**

LINCOLN, Neb., Aug. 2.—An unprecedented cold snap is giving Nebraska a premature taste of fall. At Kimball, near the Wyoming line, it snowed for several minutes yesterday. No damage to crops is anticipated, save a check in the growth of corn.

**SERIOUS COMPLI-CATIONS AHEAD.**  
Insurgents Are Likely to Cause

TROUBLE FOR THE AMERICANS AT MANILA.

Situation Sized up by a Correspondent of the London Times.

LONDON, August 2.—A despatch to the Times from Cavite, dated July 26th says:—

"It is becoming more apparent daily that there are serious complications ahead. The Americans never made a greater mistake than in bringing Aguinaldo and the insurgent leaders here, giving them arms and ammunition for the free use from the Cavite arsenal. Aguinaldo fearing annexation by the Americans, openly opposes them.

"Either he has been corrupted by some foreign power, or he has a false notion of the strength of the Philippine revolutionaries, failing to recognize that the recent successes are due to the concentration of Spanish strength at Manila consequent upon the presence of the Americans. Although he admits no foreign recognition, he talks of his government and dictates to the American authorities in absurdly inflated terms.

"He has compelled the natives at southern approaches to Manila to register their bullocks, ponies and conveyances, instructing the owners not to supply them to Americans for transportation without his sanction.

"Brig-Gen. Anderson promptly adopted firm measures, warning Aguinaldo that force would be used to impress the means of transport which were ultimately forthcoming. Aguinaldo's attitude makes future operations against Manila problematic.

"In my opinion, Manila, with the aid of the fleet, might already have been American. Nothing but the complications with the natives prevented an advance. Now the violent rains have set in, making camp and field operations arduous and threatening the health of the men, which until now has been excellent.

"Aguinaldo's forces encircle the city, making daily and nightly attacks. The Spaniards still hold the whole of the suburbs. Occasional sorties are made, in which the loss of life is slight. Two miles behind Aguinaldo's lines, south of Manila five thousand American troops are encamped. The remainder are at Cavite. Aguinaldo is understood to have objected to the advance of the Americans to ground captured by the insurgents, forgetting that his landing was effected by the grace of the Americans.

"I am convinced that the Fillipinos will never capture Manila unaided, and that if the Americans withdraw, the fate of the natives under Spanish rule will be worse than before. There will be constant fighting and trade extension would be impossible. The best solution of the political situation would be that America administer the island firmly and justly with the natives and insisting on their immediate disarmament."

St. JOHN'S, Newfoundland, Aug 4.—The Norwegian steamer Fortunate bound for Tilt Cove to load copper ore for Swansea was crushed in the ice fourteen days ago, when five hundred miles from land.

The crew of 11 men took to the boats and drifted about for twelve days covering 350 miles.

They were reduced to desperate misery owing to frost bites and want of food and water, when picked up by the steamer Southwold and landed here.

**THE EDUCATIONALISTS.**

Opening Meeting in Halifax, the Largest Ever Held in the Dominion.

HALIFAX, Aug. 2.—The meeting of the Dominion Educational Association, which assembled tonight for its opening session in Halifax, is by all odds the largest meeting of educationalists the Dominion has yet seen. No attempt has been made to count the delegates. This cannot be done before the organization meeting in the morning. The meeting tonight was one for welcome by the citizens of Halifax and was presided over by Governor Daly. It was very largely attended. Estimates by those in charge of arrangements place the probable number of delegates in the city to night at six hundred or seven hundred. The delegates are finding accommodation in the hotels and private houses. The speakers to night were Governor Daly, Attorney General Longley, Archbishop O'Brien, President Forrest, B. R. L. M. P. Alderman Faulkner, Mayor Stephen, of Halifax, Hon Boucher de la Bruere, superintendent of education, Quebec J. G. Gogin, superintendent of education for the Northwest Territories; Dr Inch of New Brunswick, Dr McCabe of Ottawa, D J McLeod of Charlottetown, and Hon W W Stetson of Maine. A letter was read from Hon G W Ross, of Ontario, expressing regret at his inability to be present, and suggesting that the schools annually observe a national holiday, to be called "Empire Day," on the school day preceding May 24th, the Queen's birthday.

**Meeting of Lobster Fishermen Packers & Suppliers**

The Minister of Marine and Fisheries will be glad to meet the lobster fishermen, packers and suppliers of the Island, at the Board of Trade room, Masonic Temple, Ch'town, on Monday next, the 8th August instant.

The question to be discussed, will be whether the present Lobster season should be continued, or shortened, or changed to a fall season.
