to introduce other things that will not be of any benefit. Let us accomplish by compromise what we have agreed to.
HON. MR. NASH: Is the Act that you are now carrying the act that we went over and amended and agreed to.
PREMIER BELL: Yes.
MR. SPEAKER DUFFY: I was not aware of any agreement to this Act and it certainly was not a party to any such agreement. I have a perfect right to think for myself, irrespective of what the Prohibition Commission thinks. I do not admit that the decision of the Supreme Court was given on this act simply on the ground alone that it touched upon wholesale importation of liquor for export. That was simply used as an illustration to show that the act was too drastic. Here you are passing another act to bolster it up upon the suggestion of the attorney of the Prohibition Commission and the fact that the Commission with the exception, has not considered it at all. The suggestion is made that when this goes through possibly the Act will be ultra vires. But it will simply mean more litigation and expense and the chances are that the Act will still be ultra vires, because the principle underlying this section is broader than merely allowing these men to import and export. In passing it you are interfering with trade and commerce and you are going beyond the powers of this Legislature; and once you do that you have trespassed on the powers given by the British North America Act. Behind it all is the principle of interference with trade. It is said that Section 52 will be made by this provision of full force and effect again, but I cannot agree with that, because the section will still remain too drastic and sweeping. The moment this section becomes law it means that if you take a bottle of liquor bought at the vendor's and transfer it to a pocket flask to go fishing with, you are liable to a fine of \$200. This act has defeated itself already because it runs to fan- tasy. As soon as it is passed it will render every member a law-breaker the moment he pours a bottle of prescribed liquor into another bottle or glass. You must drink it out of the container in which the vendor sold it to you; if you broke the original bottle and used another bottle you would be liable to be fined under this act.
HON. MR. HUGHES: The Speaker is out of order. It is after 1 o'clock and the House should be adjourned.

were provided for by making the possession of liquor for wholesale export as recognized by the federal law an exception to the general provisions of the Act. This is really the main thing which we are seeking to have inserted in our Act today and there is this consideration about it, that that Act of British Columbia was before the Privy Council in England and it was recognized as being within the power of the local legislature. So that it has the sanction of the highest court in the Empire. By taking refuge behind the British Columbia Act and incorporating into our Act the same provision I think we will be perfectly safe.
Sections 1 and 2 of the bill, amending minor sections of the original act, passed without discussion.
MR. HESSIAN moved that Clauses 3 and 4 relating to Section 52 of the original Act be struck out. This section has been declared ultra vires.
MR. SPEAKER DUFFY: I always contended that we had no right to pass such legislation. When an act goes so far as to say that no person can take a drink in his own house it is going too far. I think the hon. members who want to vote for that are very few. I maintain that I have the right to take a drink in my own house, if I should want to, without anybody saying boo to me.
PREMIER BELL: It is unfortunate that my hon. friend should bring this discussion into the House. I think he should have been a party to our understanding about this matter.
MR. SPEAKER DUFFY: I did not know anything about it.
PREMIER BELL: Well, I think my hon. friend should have had some understanding. To bring up a discussion of that kind simply means that we will be here till Doomsday. I think we might pass the sections of this act as the Commission desire it passed.
MR. D. C. McDONALD: It is true, as the hon. Speaker says, that section 52 has been declared ultra vires. It seems a ridiculous thing to bring in an amendment to it in this case and the fact that it has been declared ultra vires will certainly have the effect of having no more prosecutions brought up that would lead to the same result.
HON. MR. LEA: I have not got the right bill. (Laughter.)
OTHER HON. MEMBERS: Neither have I! Which one is it? (Laughter.)
HON. MR. LEA: I don't think this is a proper way to put a thing like this through at all.
PREMIER BELL: I want to distinctly let this committee know this: This Section 52 of the Act was declared ultra vires and it was declared to be so because it was too sweeping in character. It said that all liquor in possession of any person unless it came through the proper channels was illegal. What we are doing is simply putting a section in the act which will prevent that section from being ultra vires because we provide that the possession of liquor by the wholesale importer is a legal possession. The other slight amendments are incidental and if we put this provision through, and at the same time have a plebiscite vote submitted, then we accomplish the main thing which the Prohibition Commission asks us to accomplish. There are people in this House who object to some of these clauses in this Act and who make the motion that they be struck out. They have a perfect right of course to do so, and I don't want to enter into a discussion upon this phase of the question at all. (What we want to do is to make a compromise that will result in the main in favor of the Commission instead of attempting
