Alberton Man Gets Jail Term

SUMMERSIDE — An Alberton man, Eric George Inman, was sentenced to 30 days in Prince County court yesterday after entering a plea of guilty to a charge of unlawful theft on property exceeding \$50.

The accused was charged with theft of a lobster boat owned by Ivan Adams, Alberton South, prior to pleading guilty he elected trial by magistrate.

Alyre Joseph Gallant, Central Bedouque, was assessed a total of \$200 and costs in fines when he pleaded guilty to separate charges of care and control of a vehicle while impaired and impaired driving.

On the care and control he was fined \$75 and costs while on the impaired driving offence he was assessed a fine of \$125 and costs.

Lloyd Russell Reeves, Free-town and Leo Raymond MacDonald, Picton, were each fined \$75 and costs on separate charges of care and control while impaired.

A Richmond man, John Joseph Arsenault, was found guilty by a magistrate on an impaired driving offence and was fined \$75 and costs.

Accused who was represented by Neil R. MacLeod, had entered a not guilty plea to the charge, but after hearing the evidence of RCMP Constable Donald Bartlett, the arresting

officer, and the accused's testimony, Magistrate MacDonaid stated that he could do nothing but find the accused guilty.

A Canadian Forces Base Summerside man, Joseph Thomas Picard, entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of impaired driving and his case was adjourned to June 26.

George Edward Curtis, Albany, pleaded guilty to two separate charges of driving while his license was suspended and was fined \$50 and costs.

George Arthur Bell, Ellerslie was fined \$35 and costs on a charge of assault.

Officer Horrocks stated he and Cat-R Sweet, also from Charlottetown detachment, arrived at the scene to find the body in the ditch, the bicycle on the shoulder of the highway and the automobile, a 1965 Acadian, parked on the southwest side of the highway facing Charlottetown. Damage to the car included the right front portion while the bicycle's front wheel was completely smashed and separated from the bicycle forks.

STATE OF SHOCK — Constable Horrocks stated he talked to Mr. Gaudin who was in a state of shock and admitted striking the boy. The officer said he tested the car which operated perfectly.

Joseph Lionel Gaudin driving an automatic testified he was proceeding to Charlottetown to have his fractured leg x-rayed. Mr. Gaudin explained he was blind in one eye but had normal vision with his right eye — the side the accident occurred.

The automobile driver stated he approached the bicyclist from the rear at an estimated speed of 45-50 miles per hour. "I allowed what I thought was enough room to pass, just as I was in the processing of passing, the front wheel of the bike seemed to turn toward me."

Mr. Gaudin said he hailed a truck and asked the driver to call the police and a doctor. Evidence from Mr. Gaudin indicated he struck the boy before he was able to apply the brakes.

In previous evidence it was brought to the attention of the jury that Mr. Gaudin's license indicated that the driver had the use of one eye only.

The jury then deliberated for 45 minutes before returning with their findings. Members of the jury included: Eugene Wilfred Coady, City, foreman; Douglas Stuart Moore, Parkdale; Wendell Herbert Horton, Charlottetown; Everett Harold White, Sherwood; James Allison Moore, Charlottetown; Whitfield V. Parkdale, and John Daniel McAskill, Parkdale.

Jury Attributes Fatality To Collision With Vehicle

BY LORNE YEO Robert Cyril Toombs, South Rustico, came to his death at South Rustico as a result of being struck accidentally by an automobile driven by Lyman Joseph Gaudin, North Rustico, on the morning of June 21 at approximately 9:20 a.m. Death occurred en route to hospital about 9:50 a.m.

This was the findings of a coroner's jury at an inquest conducted by Provincial Coroner Dr. L. E. Prowse at City Hall last night.

Dr. Athol Roberts, Charlottetown physician, said he was called to the out-patients de-

partment of the P.E.I. Hospital on the morning of June 21 at approximately 10 o'clock where he pronounced the child dead.

HEAD INJURIES — Death was attributed to head injuries — fractures of the skull and blood clot — said Dr. Andrew Aquino, assistant provincial pathologist, who performed the post mortem.

Brother of the deceased, Kenneth George Toombs, testified that he was following his brother at a distance on bicycle the morning of June 21 when Mr. Gaudin passed him. Kenneth stated he didn't actually see the accident because he was looking at his milage indicator attached to the front wheel of his bike. Kenneth said the driver of the car was travelling well under the speed limit when he passed him.

A witness to the accident, Howard Carr, said he was sitting on his daughter's lawn bordering on Highway 6 when he observed the accident at a dis-

tance of approximately three tenths of a mile. SAW AUTOMOBILE — Mr. Carr stated he saw the automobile strike the boy. Mr. Carr was questioned as to the use of his eye glasses and the witness stated he used them for reading.

Gordon Johnston, funeral director at the MacLean Funeral Home, testified he received a call to go to the accident from a member of the Charlottetown RCMP detachment. Evidence from Mr. Johnston indicated the child was alive when placed in the ambulance.

Mr. Johnston stated "we were two miles from Charlottetown when I began administering mouth to mouth respiration because the child's breathing was slowing down." He said death occurred between 9:45 and 10:00 before they arrived at the hospital.

Constable John Horrocks, who described the accident scene and situation on the morning of June 21, provided a diagram of
